




WVC holds in-person graduation

WVC's 255 Initiative sees solar array installed



The new solar array that was installed on WVC's Industrial Studies building was officially commissioned on April 21.

The funding for the new solar array came from a grant through the Illinois Green Economy Network and IEPA.

During the commissioning, Michelle Knox, the founder and president of WindSolarUSA, explained the system and how to access the metrics for the system. To date, the solar array has saved 6,542 lbs. of CO2 from being emitted. That's the equivalent of planting 50 trees.

The solar array grant was part of a larger grant application submitted by WVC's 255 Initiative, a sustainability-focused program. As part of our efforts to educate our community about our sustainability efforts, we invite our community members to take a look at the metrics from our new solar array, accesible on our website.

WVC addresses bee swarm, plans to relocate to pollinator plot



On May 11, WVC Information Systems Technician Bobby Moyes discovered a swarm of honeybees congregating on a railing outside of his office. Moyes contacted the Administration for guidance as to what to do.

The administration contacted a resident beekeeper who suited up and transferred the bees into a bee box.

WVC intends to have the bees relocated to its pollinator plot on Oak Street in Mount Carmel.

The pollinator plot was planted a year ago in conjunction with Wabash Valley Service Company, IB Executive Turf and Landscape, Wabash Valley Stewardship Alliance and southeastern Illinois Farm Bureaus.

The 1.1 acre-plot was planted to provide a habitat for pollinator species, promote awareness and education on the value of pollinator species to our local economy and the impact planting perennials has on soil quality. WVC is pleased to relocate this swarm to a suitable and habitable location.

Ag program hosts annual Ag Acquaintance Day



WVC's Ag program hosted its annual Ag Acquaintance Day on April 22. Ag Acquaintance Day was the last event held last year before COVID-19 shuttered the Brubeck Arts Center theatre.

Students from several area high schools attended and participated in six unique breakout sessions. The sessions covered a variety of topics: social media do's & don'ts, WVC's Ag program, Ag careers, how to get a job in ag, ag organizations beyond high school.

The keynote speaker for the event was Southern Illinois University professor of Agribusiness Economics Dr. Sarah Bond. Bond's session was titled "Pivot & Pause."

Students were separated into school groups instead of having mixed groups as they had been before. Students wore masks during the event and CDC guidlines were followed.
