## KINNEY HIRED AS EDS INSTRUCTOR; TO BEGIN IN FALL

Gerry Kinney was recently hired as the Lead Instructor for the Electrical Distribution Systems (EDS) Program at Frontier Community College. He will officially begin teaching for the program this fall, with classes beginning August 15.

A lifelong resident of Fairfield, Kinney graduated from Fairfield Community High School in 1981. He earned an Associate in Applied Science Degree from Wabash Valley College before entering the electrical field. Kinney began working at Wayne-White Electric Cooperative as a groundman before completing the three-year lineman apprenticeship with the International Brotherhood of Electric Workers (IBEW).

Gerry Kinney is replacing Ed Patton, who was with the EDS Program for eleven years. He retired from FCC on May 10. Patton was hired in 2008 as a Lab Assistant alongside Lead Instructor Steve Rafferty. He was recruited for the position by Rafferty, as the two worked together at Mt. Carmel Public Utility Company. Patton became the Lead Instructor in 2014 and held the position until his retirement. While serving at FCC, Patton saw over 120 students graduate from the EDS Program and move on to become linemen, tree trimmers, and more.

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Kinney brings many years of experience to the program, having worked at Wayne-White for twenty years. This past year, he served as the Lab Assistant for the program alongside Patton. He also revamped the college's Lineman Rodeo event to include new competitions as well as partnerships with municipalities and cooperatives throughout Southern Illinois. Kinney resides in Fairfield with his wife, Denice.

"I'm very excited to train this incoming group of students and prepare them for careers in the electrical field," said Kinney. "This program continues to improve each year, and I'm looking forward to the new expansions and certifications we will incorporate in the fall."

Enrollment is currently open for the Electrical Distribution Systems Program, which is a one-year certificate. New program additions for the 2019-2020 academic year will allow students to obtain their flagger certification, spray applicator licensure, and Class-A CDL. Two sport camps are also on the agenda for the summer. Head Coach Brandon Benton recently hosted a three-day baseball camp with help from Assistant Coaches Jimmy Brenneman and Zach Gerch. Over 25 kids attended and developed their skills in hitting, fielding, throwing, and base running. The final day ended with a fun slip and slide activity and a free T-shirt.

Nixie Hnetkovsky, Head Coach for Frontier Volleyball, has also planned a camp to be held at the beginning of August. Kids entering grades 1-8 are invited to attend the camp, which will be held at Center Street Gym.

# FCC OFFERING 1-DAY TRIP TO ST. LOUIS, COMPLETE WITH MUNY PERFORMANCE



*Everybody cut loose!*

Frontier Community College is offering a one-day cultural trip to St. Louis on Monday, July 22, complete with a musical performance of *Footloose* at The Muny. Registration is now open for the trip, and it is available to individuals of high school age and older.

Based on the 1984 Academy Award-nominated blockbuster hit, *Footloose* shows how a little teenage rebellion and love of music can open hearts and transform a town. Featuring chart-topping hits, including “Let’s Hear It for the Boy,” “Holding Out for a Hero,” and “Footloose,” this dancing sensation will have the entire family burning and yearning to cut loose.

The Muny is a beautiful, outdoor theatre located in Forest Park of St. Louis. Seven shows are performed each summer season, and showtime begins shortly before sunset. Serving as America’s oldest and largest outdoor theatre, The Muny is celebrating its 101st season with a lineup of shows including *Guys and Dolls*, *Paint Your Wagon*, and *Cinderella*.

The charter bus will depart at 11:00AM from the West Hall parking lot on FCC’s campus and head for the St. Louis Gateway Arch. Guests will take a tram ride to the top of America’s tallest man-made monument, as well as a visit to the Arch exhibits.

The St. Louis Riverfront Cruise is next on the agenda, and guests will be treated to a one-hour riverboat tour on the Mississippi River. Afterwards, the group will have dinner at The Old Spaghetti Factory, just two blocks from the Arch. The meal will include salad, bread, a choice of three entrée options, and homemade Spumoni ice cream.

The group will then head to Forest Park for a backstage tour at The Muny, available only to group ticketholders. The tour will show visitors how stage sets are designed and built, and it will culminate on the grand stage, where the cast faces an 11,000 seat audience. The Muny has spent the off-season undergoing major renovations, so guests will have the opportunity to see the new stage, orchestra pit, and more.

Thanks to the Wal-Mart Community Grant that FCC received in May, the total cost for the all-inclusive cultural package is only \$125 per person. To reserve your seat, call FCC at 618-842-3711.
