## AGENDA #6 - "Policy First Readings (and Possible Approval)" -

#6-A. Military Leave Policy 400.21: IECC fully complies with State and Federal legislation concerning the rights of personnel in the Armed Services, Reserve and National Guard units. Recent changes in legislation require the district to continue insurance and leave benefits of those called to active duty and to provide salary continuation when personnel are called for short training sessions. The CEO recommended approval of the revised Military Leave Policy 400.21, reflecting the required changes, as presented in the Board Agenda materials for this meeting.

**Board Action:** Mr. Williams made a motion to waive second reading and adopt the revised Military Leave Policy 400.21 as recommended. Dr. Rost seconded the motion and on a recorded roll call vote ordered by the Chair the following trustees voted yea:

Mrs. Culver, Mr. Koertge, Mr. Lane, Dr. Rost, Mr. Williams, Miss Wolfe. Trustees voting nay: None. Trustees absent: Dr. Fischer, Miss Pennington. The motion having received 6 yea votes and 0 nay votes, the Chair declared the motion carried.

<u>AGENDA #8 – "Staff Recommendations for Approval"</u> – The following staff recommendations were presented for approval.

#8-A. Annual Report Card on Institutional Effectiveness for 2004: Ms. Cantwell reviewed the IECC Annual Report Card for fiscal year 2004. The report card describes the district's effectiveness in meeting its stated mission and purpose. Among key findings in the report card: Illinois Eastern continues to lead the state in service to its residents, with a head count enrollment of 78 students and a full-time equivalency enrollment of 33 students per 1000 population. Ninety-eight percent of students enrolled on the 10<sup>th</sup> day of the fall semester were still enrolled at midterm and 94 percent of students enrolled on the 10<sup>th</sup> day of classes completed their classes. An average of 96 percent of transfer students and 90 percent of career and technical students surveyed were satisfied with the overall quality of instruction they received at IECC. Ninety percent of students surveyed indicated they were satisfied with IECC student support services. Student pass rate on the cosmetology license exam was 96 percent, on the radiography license exam 62 percent, on the practical nursing license exam 100 percent, and on the registered nursing exam 85 percent. Ninety percent of employers returning surveys rated IECC graduates as having the necessary skills to perform in the workplace. Eighty-five percent of students enrolled in adult basic and adult secondary education

classes completed their courses. More than \$5.6-million in financial aid was disbursed to IECC students in fiscal year 2003. IECC's unit cost of \$143.87 was below the state average of \$191.09. Information contained in the report card is used to identify and support modifications that will increase student success. The report card indicates that the district has met or exceeded established standards.

Recommendation: The CEO recommended approval of the Annual Report Card as presented.

#8-B. Marathon Ashland Petroleum Refinery: The CEO recommended approval of an agreement with other taxing bodies of Crawford County, Illinois, to employ Mr. Stuart Whitt, legal counsel who specializes in refinery assessment, to represent them in negotiations with Marathon Ashland Refinery to work toward an equitable assessment of the property owned by Marathon Ashland. Each taxing body pays the same percentage of the legal bill as the taxing body receives in tax receipts. For 2002 taxes paid in 2003, applicable to services rendered March 11, 2003 through June 30, 2004, IECC's percentage is 6.7%.

**Board Action:** Mr. Koertge made a motion to approve the agreement with other taxing bodies in Crawford County, Illinois, to hire Mr. Stuart Whitt, legal counsel, to negotiate a new property tax assessment agreement with Marathon Ashland Petroleum as outlined. Dr. Rost seconded the motion and on a recorded roll call vote ordered by the Chair the following trustees voted yea:

Mrs. Culver, Mr. Koertge, Mr. Lane, Dr. Rost, Mr. Williams, Miss Wolfe. Trustees voting nay: None. Trustees absent: Dr. Fischer, Miss Pennington. The motion having received 6 yea votes and 0 nay votes, the Chair declared the motion carried.

FY04 Department of Corrections Amendment: The CEO recommended approval of an amendment to IECC's FY04 contract with the Illinois Department of Corrections for the LTC educational programs at the Lawrence Correctional Center and the Robinson Correctional Center. Lawrence Correctional Center's budget is decreased by \$105,400.31. Robinson Correctional Center's budget is increased by \$4,870.00 The new budgetary amounts are as follows:

The CEO recommended that he be authorized to submit to the Illinois Department of Corrections the necessary documents for new contracts for FY2005 for the educational programs at the correctional centers.

# RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES BUILDING AND MAINTENANCE FUND EXPENDITURE

WHEREAS, expenses payable from taxes levied for operations, building and maintenance purposes and for the purchase of school grounds are subject to 110 ILCS 805/3-20.3.

WHEREAS, funds expended for obligations incurred for the improvement, maintenance, repair or benefit of buildings and property, including cost of interior decorating and the installation, improvement, repair, replacement and maintenance of building fixtures, for the rental of buildings and property for community college purposes or for the payment of all premiums for insurance upon buildings and building fixtures shall be paid from tax levied for operations, building and maintenance purposes and the purchase of school grounds,

WHEREAS, payment of all salaries for janitors, engineers and for other custodial employees and all costs of fuel, lights, gas, water, and custodial supplies and equipment, or the cost of a professional survey of the conditions of school building, or any one or more of the preceding items may not be paid from tax levied for operations, building and maintenance purposes and the purchase of school grounds without resolution of the Board of Trustees,

SO BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of the Illinois Eastern Community College District No. 529 by resolution authorizes the Chief Executive Officer of the District to budget and expend funds from tax for operations, building and maintenance purposes for the payment of salaries of janitors, engineers or other custodial employees, such other contractors as required, and all costs of fuel, lights, gas, water, and custodial supplies and equipment or the cost of a professional survey of the condition of school buildings or of any one or more of the preceding items.

SUBJECT: Working Cash Fund

State statute requires that the Board of Trustees approve by resolution the transfer of interest earned on the Working Cash Fund to the General Fund for the purpose of paying general obligations of the District. Attached is a resolution to comply with that requirement.

Each year the principal of the Working Cash Fund remains intact. If for some reason the principal was spent and the District was unable to repay it, the Working Cash Fund would be gone. The only way for reestablishment is through voter referendum.

Official action is required by the Board on this recommendation.

I recommend that the prevailing rate of wages determined by the Illinois Department of Labor be approved for the counties of Crawford, Richland, Wabash, and Wayne.

# AN ORDINANCE OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF ILLINOIS EASTERN COMMUNITY COLLEGES COUNTIES OF CRAWFORD, RICHLAND, WABASH AND WAYNE, ILLINOIS ASCERTAINING THE PREVAILING RATE OF WAGES FOR LABORERS, MECHANICS AND OTHER WORKERS EMPLOYED IN ANY PUBLIC WORKS OF SAID DISTRICT

WHEREAS, the State of Illinois has enacted "An Act regulating wages of laborers, mechanics and other workers employed in any public works by the State, county, city or any public body or any political subdivision or by any one under contract for public works," approved June 26, 1941, as amended and

WHEREAS, the aforesaid Act requires that the Board of Trustees of Illinois Eastern Community Colleges District #529, counties of Crawford, Richland, Wabash and Wayne investigate and ascertain the prevailing rate of wages as defined in said Act for laborers, mechanics and other workers in the locality of said Board of Trustees, employed in performing construction of public works, for said Board of Trustees.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER AND BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF ILLINOIS EASTERN COMMUNITY COLLEGES DISTRICT #529:

SECTION 1: To the extent and as required by "An Act regulating wages of laborers, mechanics and other workers employed in any public works by State, county, city or any public body or any political subdivision or by any one under contract for public works," approved June 26, 1941, as amended, the general prevailing rate of wages in this locality for laborers, mechanics and other workers engaged in construction of public works coming under the jurisdiction of the Board of Trustees is hereby ascertained to be the same as the prevailing rate of wages for construction work in Crawford, Richland, Wabash and Wayne Counties as determined by the Department of Labor of the State of Illinois as of **June of 2004**, a copy of that determination being attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference. As required by said Act, any and all revisions of the prevailing rate of wages by the Department of Labor of the State of Illinois shall supersede the Department's June determination and apply to any and all public works construction undertaken by the Board of Trustees. The definition of any terms appearing in this Ordinance which are also used in aforesaid Act shall be the same as in said Act.

SECTION 2: Nothing herein contained shall be construed to apply said general prevailing rate of wages as herein ascertained to any work or employment except public works construction of the BOARD OF TRUSTEES to the extent required by the aforesaid Act.

SECTION 3: The Board Secretary shall publicly post or keep available for inspection by any interested party in the main office of the Board of Trustees this determination or any revisions of such prevailing rate of wage. A copy of this determination or of the current revised determination of prevailing rate of wages then in effect shall be attached to all contract specifications.

SECTION 4: The Board Secretary shall mail a copy of this determination to any employer, and to any association of employers and to any person or association of employees who have filed their names and addresses, requesting copies of any determination stating the particular rates and the particular class of workers whose wages will be affected by such rates.

SECTION 5: The Board Secretary shall promptly file a certified copy of this Ordinance with <u>both</u> the Secretary of State Index Division and the Department of Labor of the State of Illinois.

SECTION 6: The Board Secretary shall cause to be published in a newspaper of general circulation within the area a copy of this Ordinance, and such publication shall constitute notice that the determination is effective and that this is the determination of this public body.

#### CRAWFORD COUNTY

The following list is considered as those days for which holiday rates of wages for work performed apply: New Years Day, Memorial/Decoration Day, Fourth of July, Labor Day, Veterans Day, Thanksgiving Day, Christmas Day. Generally, any of these holidays which fall on a Sunday is celebrated on the following Monday. This then makes work performed on that Monday payable at the appropriate overtime rate for holiday pay. Oil and chip resealing (O&C) means the application of road oils and liquid asphalt to coat an existing road surface, followed by application of aggregate chips or gravel to coated surface, and subsequent rolling of material to seal the surface.

#### EXPLANATION OF CLASSES

#### COMMUNICATION SYSTEMS TECHNICIAN

Installation, operation, inspection, maintenance, repair, and service of radio, television, recording, voice sound and vision production and

reproduction apparatus, equipment and appliances used for domestic, commercial, education, entertainment and private telephone systems.

TRUCK DRIVER - BUILDING, HEAVY AND HIGHWAY CONSTRUCTION Class 1. Drivers on 2 axle trucks hauling less than 9 ton. Air compressor and welding machines and brooms, including those pulled by separate units, truck driver helpers, warehouse employees, mechanic helpers, greasers and tiremen, pickup trucks when hauling materials, tools, or workers to and from and on-the-job site, and fork lifts up to 6,000 lb. capacity.

- Class 2. Two or three axle trucks hauling more than 9 ton but hauling less than 16 ton. A-frame winch trucks, hydrolift trucks, vactor trucks or similar equipment when used for transportation purposes. Fork lifts over 6,000 lb. capacity, winch trucks, four axle combination units, and ticket writers.
- Class 3. Two, three or four axle trucks hauling 16 ton or more. Drivers on water pulls, articulated dump trucks, mechanics and working forepersons, and dispatchers. Five axle or more combination units.
- Class 4. Low Boy and Oil Distributors.
- Class 5. Drivers who require special protective clothing while employed on hazardous waste work.

#### TRUCK DRIVER - OIL AND CHIP RESEALING ONLY.

This shall encompass laborers, workers and mechanics who drive contractor or subcontractor owned, leased, or hired pickup, dump, service, or oil distributor trucks. The work includes transporting materials and equipment (including but not limited to, oils, aggregate supplies, parts, machinery and tools) to or from the job site; distributing oil or liquid asphalt and aggregate; stock piling material when in connection with the actual oil and chip contract. The Truck Driver (Oil & Chip Resealing) wage classification does not include supplier delivered materials.

#### OPERATING ENGINEERS - BUILDING, HEAVY AND HIGHWAY CONSTRUCTION

Class 1. Power Cranes, Draglines, Derricks, Shovels, Gradalls, Mechanics, Tractor Highlift, Tournadozer, Concrete Mixers with Skip, Tournamixer, Two Drum Machine, One Drum Hoist with Tower or Boom, Cableways, Tower Machines, Motor Patrol, Boom Tractor, Boom or Winch Truck, Winch or Hydraulic Boom Truck, Truck Crane, Tournapull, Tractor Operating Scoops, Bulldozer, Push Tractor, Asphalt Planer, Finishing Machine on Asphalt, Large Rollers on Earth, Rollers on Asphalt Mix, Ross Carrier or similar Machine, Gravel Processing Machine, Asphalt Plant Engineer, Paver Operator, Dredging Equipment, or Dredge Engineer, or Dredge Operator, Central Mix Plant Engineer, CMI or similar type machine, Concrete Pump, Truck or Skid Mounted, Tower Crane, Engineer or Rock Crusher Plant, Concrete Plant Engineer, Ditching Machine with dual attachment, Tractor Mounted Loaders, Cherry Picker, Hydro Crane, Standard or Dinkey Locomotives, Scoopmobiles, Euclid Loader, Soil Cement Machine, Back Filler, Elevating Machine, Power Blade, Drilling Machine, including Well Testing, Caissons, Shaft or any similar type drilling machines, Motor Driven Paint Machine, Pipe Cleaning Machine, Pipe Wrapping Machine, Pipe Bending Machine, Apsco Paver, Boring Machine, (Head Equipment Greaser), Barber-Greene Loaders, Formless Paver, (Well Point System), Concrete Spreader, Hydra Ax, Span Saw, Marine Scoops, Brush Mulcher, Brush Burner, Mesh

Class 2. #### 1. A narration which justifies the use of capital renewal funds for the project:

Olney Central College: Stairways exterior to the building at Olney Central College are enclosed by safety glass to protect students, faculty, staff, and visitors from the elements as they travel between the first and second floor of Wattleworth Hall. However, these stairs are made of concrete and become very slippery on raining or snowing days as the moisture is tracked in by pedestrians. These stairways are near interior and exterior doors leading into, and out of, Wattleworth Hall and they receive heavy use as they are the only stairways available for travel between floors.

Olney Central College: The existing fluorescent lighting fixtures in the OCC gymnasium are original to the facility, nearly 30 years old. The fixtures are in constant need of repair and attention, and lighting efficiency has been compromised over time.

#### 2. A project scope:

Olney Central College: On the stair steps, attached a non-slip vinyl tread to all the steps. At the landing, attach a thicker non-slip ceramic tile and/or vinyl landing material. This will allow installation of a tactile warning strip at each landing to comply with the ADA and the Illinois Environmental Barrier Act.

Olney Central College: Replace the original fluorescent lighting fixtures in the OCC gymnasium with new metal halide fixtures.




