Rebecca Carmack

Rebecca Carmack has been named the new Director of Music and Performing Arts Coordinator at Lincoln Trail College.

Carmack holds a bachelor's degree from Southern Illinois University at Carbondale in Music Theory and Composition and a master's degree in choral and orchestral conducting from Eastern Illinois University.

Prior to her arrival at Lincoln Trail College, Carmack operated a private voice and piano studio and taught 5th through 12th grade band.

While at EIU, Carmack gained experience working with many of the university's ensembles, including Eastern Symphonic Orchestra, the Concert Choir, and the early music ensemble, Camerata.

Among the works she conducted are Tomas Luis de Victoria's Ave Maria, Kevin A. Memley's O My Love's Like a Red, Red Rose, and Franz Doppler's Fantasie Pastorale Hongrois Flute Concerto. Rebecca was also a featured soprano soloist with the ESO for major works such as the "Pie Jesu" from Faure's Requiem and "Rejoice, Greatly" from Handel's Messiah.

INTO THE WOODS AUDITIONS

Auditions for the upcoming production of *Into the Woods* by Stephen Sondheim, from the book by James Lapine, will be held September 19 and 20 at 6 p.m. in the LTC Theater located in the Zwermann Arts Center at Lincoln Trail College. Actors need only attend one audition session. Wednesday, September 21 is reserved for callbacks, if necessary. The first read-through with the entire cast is September 22. Please bring your list of conflicts and scheduling preferences at the time of your audition. The rehearsal schedule will be discussed at the first read-through.

Into the Woods is an epic fairytale about wishes, family and the choices we make. The story follows a Baker and his wife, who wish to have a child; Cinderella, who wishes to attend the King's Festival; and Jack, who wishes his cow would give milk. When the Baker and his wife learn that they cannot have a child because of a Witch's curse, the two set off on a journey to break the curse. Everyone's wish is granted, but the consequences of their actions return to haunt them later with disastrous results. It was adapted into a film version in 2014 featuring Meryl Streep and Johnny Depp. *Into the Woods* has been rated PG-13 for thematic elements.

The cast calls for seven men and ten women, but also includes voiceovers and cameos. Some of the roles could be filled by teenaged actors. Auditioners should choose a cutting for their preferred role. However, they may be asked to read other characters and may be considered for other roles. Everyone will sing the same musical selection.

FROM LTC TO THE SEAS TO RIO



Christopher Ash spent time learning the performing arts while at Lincoln Trail College. Now he works as the Production Stage Manager on the *Norwegian Getaway* for Norwegian Cruise Lines.

He started working on the cruise ship in January of 2016. He says making the transition in careers to work in theater has been great. “Theater has always been a part of my life, since about freshman year of high school, it is such a fundamental part of who I am. Being a part of the LTC theater program just helped solidify the fact that changing jobs and going for something in theater is where I belonged all along.”

Ash runs the theater on the *Norwegian Getaway*. He says the ship has two main stage venues and he has the biggest of the two. Ash is in charge of the scheduling for the shows *Burn the Floor* and *Million Dollar Quartet*. He also handles scheduling of the day-to-day game shows that take place in the theater. His job has him working closely with Guest Services, the Cruise Director and the ship’s Production manager.

As a part of Ash’s job, he got to go to Rio de Janeiro during the 2016 Summer Olympics. His ship was chartered during the Olympics. During the Summer Games, he says his ship performed one show the whole time they were in Rio, which was close to three weeks. His ship saw a number of famous athletes in that time, including the United States Men’s Basketball Team and Floyd Mayweather.

While in Rio, Ash also got to enjoy parts of the Olympics and the city. “The time in Rio was amazing! I got to see several events, Fencing, Diving, Volleyball, and the Closing Ceremony. I walked around the city and took the metro and taxis, it was very safe. It honestly put me in the mindset of New York, loads of people, the traffic was a bit crazy.”

Ash remembers his time at Lincoln Trail College fondly. “During my time at LTC I had the privilege of learning from some of the best teachers I’ve ever had. Barb Shimer, Jeshua Franklin, Yvonne Newlin, just to name a few. I also was blessed to be able to be in one of my all-time favorite shows, *Les Miserables*. Barb Shimer was gracious enough to take a chance and cast me as Marius, and I will forever remember that role. It is my favorite role I have ever played.”

He says he would definitely recommend LTC. “It is a smaller campus with great teachers, and a solid curriculum. The classes are just the right size so you are able to have access to the teachers with any questions you might have. It was just a great experience I am just glad that I was able to have it.”

The workshop on baby food will teach people how they can make healthy, homemade baby food.


The class will cover topics like

Lincoln Trail College alumnus Shane Noble ('06) was inducted into the Southwest High Schools Athletic Hall of Fame on Sept. 10

Noble transferred to LTC from Wabash College. As a member of the Little Giants, he led the team in home runs and was in the top five in seven offensive categories.

While at Lincoln Trail College, Noble helped guide the Statesmen to a Great Rivers Athletic Conference title along with a region championship.

Noble went on to play two years at Bellarmine College, where he earned a second team all-conference selection as a junior and a first-team selection as a senior. He led the team with 58 RBI in 2008.

Noble earned a bachelor's and a master's degree from Bellarmine and now teaches English and social studies in Louisville, Ky.

STATESMEN RETURN TO BUSCH STADIUM

The Lincoln Trail College Statesmen baseball team is returning to Busch Stadium this fall for an exhibition game.

The Statesmen face Lewis and Clark on Oct. 2. The two teams played each other last year at Busch Stadium. The game immediately follows the Cardinals vs. the Pirates.

“This is a great event for our players,” says Statesmen coach Kevin Bowers. “The game is an exhibition and we do our best to try to get everyone that’s healthy in the game.”

Tickets for the Baseball at Busch game are available now. Fans get a ticket to the Cardinals’ game against the Pirates that afternoon in addition to the chance to watch the Statesmen at Busch Stadium.

“Fans are really getting three games for the price of one,” says Bowers. The game is the regular season finale for the Cardinals and the team is giving out free ticket vouchers for a 2017 game. Fans will also get a 2017 Cardinals Magnet Schedule and children under 48” receive a free ticket to Six Flags that is valid any Sunday until Oct. 30.

Bowers says the players are looking forward to playing at Busch Stadium again. “Last year was such a great event and the people with the Cardinals and Busch Stadium made it such a special experience for our guys.”
