LTC PHI THETA KAPPA EARNS FIVE STAR HONOR



Lincoln Trail College's Phi Theta Kappa Honor Society chapter has once again been recognized as one of the best by earning five-star status. That's the highest level of recognition for a chapter.

"Phi Theta Kappa chapters have five levels of engagement that progress from local, campus involvement to regional involvement to international involvement," says LTC chapter advisor Kim Schucker. "The Five Star Chapter plan is the roadmap to guiding the chapter through the levels. Chapters like ours use the plan as a guide for building strong, active chapters."

Schucker says the Five Star plan starts with some basics like holding an induction ceremony, submitting an annual report, and working to create awareness of the chapter on campus. The chapter also elects officers, conducts research on an honors topic, and the chapter has to meet with college administration to set and report chapter goals.

From there, LTC's chapter developed an Honors in Action project and a college project. LTC's chapter worked with the college to help with recruitment. The chapter also developed a brochure to help raise awareness about Phi Theta Kappa at Lincoln Trail College and how students can join. For the Honors project, the students studied myth and reality dealing with the building of the pyramids.

To earn the fourth star, LTC's chapter held to Phi Theta Kappa awareness days on campus. They also attended the Illinois Region Leadership and Honors Topic Conference at Lewis and Clark Community College. In addition to that, the

He participated in a Q&A session giving insight into his ideas and beliefs.







STUDENT ATHLETES COMBINE FOR 3.21 GPA IN 2017-18 ACADEMIC YEAR



For the ninth consecutive semester, student-athletes at Lincoln Trail College have combined to have a GPA of at least 3.0. The athletes combined for a 3.15 GPA in the Spring '18 semester and for the 2017-18 academic year, they combined for a 3.21 GPA.

"I'm really proud of our athletes," says Athletic Director Kevin Bowers. "They work very hard in their sports, but they also put in a lot of effort in the classroom and that shows."

The softball team recorded the top marks among LTC teams with a combined 3.41 GPA for the academic year. The team had a 3.51 GPA in the spring.

The baseball team finished the year with a 3.32 GPA and the volleyball team was right behind with a 3.31 GPA. The women's basketball team had a 3.17 GPA, the golf team finished the year with a 2.99 GPA and the men's basketball team ended the year with a 2.75 GPA.

"We want our players to succeed academically," says Bowers. "When they succeed in the classroom, that sets them up to be successful after they leave Lincoln Trail College and that's very important to our coaches and the faculty and staff at the college."

Bowers says that one of the reasons student-athletes at Lincoln Trail College are able to perform as well as they do in the classroom is because of the academic help available to not just athletes, but all students. "We're very fortunate to have so many caring people at LTC. Our instructors work hard to set up our students to succeed. We also have great resources available in the Learning Skills Center and in the Library. Our advisors also do a great job."

FOUR SPRING ATHLETES EARN POSTSEASON HONORS

Four Lincoln Trail College athletes have been honored for their achievements on the field this spring.



Outfielder Jordan Brewer was named All-Northern District, All-Great Rivers Athletic Conference, and All-Region. Brewer, who committed to the University of Michigan, batted .367 with 31 RBI. Brewer is a two-time All-Conference and All-Region selection.



Pitcher Kaleb Huxford earned All-Conference and All-Region honors. Huxford, who committed to Saint Leo University, went 5-1 with a 1.53 ERA for the Statesmen. He struck out 74 batters in his 59 innings pitched.



Outfielder Tucker Greer earned All-Conference honors. Greer had a .357 average with 22 RBI for the Statesmen. He's committed to Young Harris College.



Softball player Amanda Craig earned All-Conference honors. Craig, who committed to Oakland City University, had a .324 average with 25 RBI. She led the Lady Statesmen with 18 doubles.
