LTC HELPS AREA STUDENTS LEARN ABOUT CAREER OPTIONS

Lincoln Trail College welcomed seventh graders and sophomores from Crawford and Lawrence Counties to the annual Twin Rivers-Lincoln Trail College Career Day event on March 4. The annual event helps the students plan for their futures by exploring different careers and hearing career advice.

When the students arrived, they gathered in the Zwermann Arts Center Theater where they heard from LTC Dean Brent Todd and Eastern Illinois University Director of Career Services Bobbi Kingery. They each gave students an overview of what to be thinking about when they choose a career path.

After that, the students attended breakout sessions on different career types. People working in those career areas gave a brief overview of their jobs and talked about the skills, education, and qualifications students will need if they want to be in those fields. They also talked about what they liked the most about their jobs and gave students some insight on what they can expect for starting wages.

The students were allowed to choose two different career paths for their breakout sessions. Topics included Agriculture, Business/Office, Education, Small Business, Fine Arts, Food/Hospitality, Industrial, Construction, Medical, Veterinarian, Science, Marketing, Social Services, Law, Legal, Cosmetology, Technology, Early Childhood, Military, and Mechanic.

Outstanding Artist Award for "Ollie Octopus."

Lincoln Trail College recognized Crawford County's young artists at this year's annual Celebrate Art! Event on March 5. The annual event invites high school artists to submit their work for a competition and also brings the artists to the College to hear from a professional artist.

Crawford County high school students submitted 61 pieces of art for this year's Celebrate Art! competition. The artwork was on display in the Library and was judged by Gregg Bonelli, Kelly Mullins, Brent Todd, and Winter Harmsen. They judged the work based on creativity, composition, and technique.

The judges chose eight standout pieces. Seven were awarded Outstanding Artist Awards and one was selected as Best of Show. This year's Best of Show winner was Wisteria Feigel of Oblong High School for her piece "Warning." She also earned an

Hutsonville High School's Ian Abendroth earned Outstanding Artist Awards for "Jessica, Shut Up I Swear" and "Oh, I'm Blocky." Oblong High School's Maddi Patterson earned Outstanding Artist Awards for "Penni" and "Aaahhhhh." Alyssa Fielder of Oblong High School earned an Outstanding Artist Award for "Turtle" and Hutsonville High School's Madeline Knecht earned an Outstanding Artist Award for "Bed Bug."

The eight works of art will be on display in the LTC Library March 9 through April 24.

This year's featured artist was Steve Meadows, the owner of S.D. Meadows Folk Art Gallery in Palestine. Meadows grew up in Willow Hill and is a graduate of Oblong High School. He studied Architectural Drafting before taking drawing and painting classes. His art was put on hold by the Vietnam War and when he returned, he used the G.I. Bill to finish his art education at Eastern Illinois University.

He began his art career carving wood folk art, which he sold at folk art shows across the country. One of his first big jobs was from the Valley Forge Show where he was asked to create 50 penguins a month for six months for the Museum of American Folk Art in New York City. He also created 15,000 fish decoys for Eddie Bauer. Bloomingdale's

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Department Store in New York had him create 13 patriotic penguins for its Fourth of July window display. Meadows' art has been featured on HGTV and he has a walking stick carving called "Uncle Sam" in the permanent folk-art collection at the Smithsonian Institute.

Meadows now creates pieces from things many people throw away. He showed the students his "junk art" and talked to them about his creative process. Meadows talked about how he has evolved as an artist over his career and encouraged students to continue exploring their creativity.

Many of the students that attended the event are members of the Future Business Leaders of America club while others were from Sheryl Brummer's business classes.

The students were asked to dress in business attire for the luncheon. They were served a full-course meal and practiced professional etiquette principles. LTC Director of College Access Tona Ambrose led the luncheon, held in LTC's Statesmen Grill.

Ambrose taught the students things like the importance of proper greetings, how to sit, how to use the various utensils on the table, and how to properly eat. "There will be a day when these students will need these techniques," says Ambrose. "It may be for a formal dinner like a wedding reception or it may be for something work-related or a job interview. We wanted to make sure that the students would leave with an understanding of proper etiquette so that they can leave a positive impression."

After the luncheon, the students had the opportunity to tour the Lincoln Trail College campus. Ambrose also talked with the students about college and career options and also covered other helpful post-secondary topics.



THREE PLAYERS EARN POSTSEASON AWARDS

and All-Region honors.

Three Lincoln Trail College basketball players earned postseason honors.

Women's basketball player Jaylynn Brown was named All-Conference by the Great Rivers Athletic Conference. She was also All-Region in Region 24. Brown led the Lady Statesmen by averaging 13.7 points per game. She shot 48.3 percent from the field and was a 40.2 percent three-point shooter. The sophomore averaged 6.8 rebounds per game and 3.4 assists per game.

"It was really good to see this for her," says coach Scott Sparks. "She worked really hard in the offseason and focused on improving her game and on being more of a leader. Last year she had some peaks and valleys on the court, but this year she really pushed herself to be a consistent player, to take care of the ball, to score when needed, and to get her teammates involved. What's great about JB is she's such a versatile player. She creates tough matchups because she's able to play four positions in our league."

On the men's side, Dante Combs and Lamar Lillard each earned All-Conference

Combs averaged 12.4 points per game and 3.6 rebounds per game for the Statesmen. The sophomore shot 49.4 percent from the field, 41.4 percent from three-point range and was an 83.3 percent shooter at the free-throw line.

"One of Dante's biggest strengths is that he's a terrific scorer," says coach Luke Stuckey. "He's a great shooter and he brings a lot of athleticism to the floor. He really came on strong late in the season and really got better down the stretch."

Lillard started all but one game for the Statesmen in the 2019-2020 campaign. He averaged 10.8 points per game and seven rebounds per game.

"Lamar is a winning player," says Stuckey. "He's been a winner everywhere he's been.



His stats may not look all that impressive, but he's a guy you can plug in where you need him. He's also an incredibly tough

player and you can see that toughness through the fact he led the team in rebounds as a guard."

Both Sparks and Stuckey believe their players will be good additions to their next programs.

"I really like the school," says Bangoura. "It's pretty nice and so is the team. They offered me a scholarship and I thought it was all a good fit for me."

Bangoura played one year for the Lady Statesmen. She led the team with 258 kills and added 286.5 points for the Lady Statesmen.

LTC Coach Dana Goodwin says Bangoura will be a good addition to Lock Haven. "She had an awesome energy and spirit that she carried on the court. She really was quite the leader for the team. She's an outstanding hitter and I think as long as she gets that shoulder under control, she'll be a key hitter for them as well."

Bangoura, who played as an outside hitter for LTC, says one of her goals at Lock Haven is to play all the way around the court. That's a goal Goodwin thinks that Bangoura will work on her passing and with her determination and motivation, she should be able to achieve that goal.

In the classroom, Bangoura plans to study Communications. She says she would like to be a flight attendant after she graduates.
