LTC honored for student success

Lincoln Trail College is No. 1. According to a list recently featured on CNN Money, the college received the No. 1 state ranking and the No. 12 national ranking for student success among public two-year colleges.

Released by College Measures, a joint venture of the American Institutes of Research and Matrix Knowledge Group, the chart for CNN Money is a tool to assist students in determining which school will give them the best chance of transferring to a four-year institution. Rankings are based on the percentage of students who graduate within three years or transfer to four-year colleges.

LTC took top honors in Illinois with its 71.9 percent graduation and transfer rate.

"This rating indicates the excellent job of educating students that the faculty and staff at LTC are doing," said Illinois Eastern Community Colleges Chief Executive Officer Terry Bruce. "It follows the Aspen Institute ranking that put LTC in the top 120 community colleges in the nation."

In addition to the top student success spot, the college also boasts one of the highest first-year student retention rates in the state, 88.1 percent.

"We attribute Lincoln Trail College's student success rate to a myriad of factors, contributors, and role players," said LTC Dean of Instruction Robert Conn. "One of the strengths of being a small community college in a rural area is the ability to have a positive impact on the lives of our students with our highly engaged faculty and staff.

"We believe in our students and have dedicated our careers to our mission: to deliver exceptional education and services to improve the lives of our students and to strengthen our communities."

Concealed carry courses at LTC

Area residents interested in obtaining a Concealed Carry License are invited to enroll in one of two sessions of Concealed Carry courses offered this summer at Lincoln Trail College.

The first session will meet from 6 to 10 p.m. July 24 and 25 at LTC and 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. July 26 at Crackshot Range, located south of the airport. The second session will meet from 6 to 10 p.m. Aug. 21 and 22 at LTC and from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Aug. 23 at Crackshot Range.

Through lecture and range drills, participants will learn the information required by the Concealed Carry Act and also how to safely handle a handgun. They will also hone their marksman skills and learn how to survive a real-world encounter.

Open to experienced and amateur shooters, the course will teach students how to maintain the proper mindset, skills and abilities that come with bearing arms for self-defense.

Pre-registration is required. The cost of the 16-hour course is \$167 for in-District students and must be paid in advance. Participants over 60 years old pay \$90.
