### Welding Program utilizing new equipment

Olney Central College has acquired new equipment for its Welding Program through a U.S. Economic Development Administration Grant.

An OMAX Water Jet machine, two Lincoln Electric downdraft tables and 11 Lincoln Electric welders have been acquired for student use. Instructor Curtis Marshall said the updates will give students experience utilizing the state-of-the-art equipment they will encounter in the workplace.

Numerous Fortune 500 companies utilize the OMAX-manufactured water jets. The most popular water jets on the market, they enable users to create a precision cut with a high-pressure stream of water.

"Before, students would have to mill parts out," Marshall said. "Now we can put metal on the water jet and get a high-quality cut. We can use it to cut glass, stone and wood. It will cut through anything."

Students also will benefit from the addition of the new downdraft tables, which pull air

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away and downward, preventing welders from breathing dust, fumes and smoke produced in the cutting and grinding process. The shop also stays cleaner as the dust is trapped in the table's bin.

"It's much healthier for the students and we are really happy to get these," Marshall added.

The new welders feature a digital display and can be used for MIG, TIG, Stick and Flux Core welding.

"They are a lot more effective and will provide the students with a better learning experience because they won't be swapping hoses when they get ready to perform a different process."

They also include a USB port and can operate software. Marshall noted employers can track worker productivity with the equipment.

"I feel we have one of the best welding schools in the country," Marshall said. "What we do here is equivalent to or a lot better than the bigger welding schools. It's also more affordable."

### Celebrating the Year of the Nurse with Alumnus Ryan Millsap

As the Night Nurse Coordinator at Carle Richland Memorial Hospital in Olney, Ryan Millsap never knows what his shift will bring.

"Sometimes it's laid back and other times it's high intensity," Millsap said. "I look after all of the functions of the hospital when the department supervisors aren't there. You are the resource for any questions. I'm there to help with the difficult IV sticks at night and for emergencies that might arise. I also help if there is a procedure one of the nurses hasn't performed before. I also observe all the nurses doing rounds and patient care. I watch the flow and make sure every nurse can do their best. I also ensure the rooms are clean and everyone is happy. In this job, you're a jack of all trades."

Millsap had already completed an associate's degree in general studies at Olney Central College when he decided to switch careers. He enrolled in the Illinois Eastern Community Colleges/Olney Central College Associate Degree in Nursing Program in 2013.

"I had watched my sister who was two years ahead of me in the program and she had just finished," he said. "Because of her, I knew what to expect. I was working as an EMT so it was an easy transition into nursing."

After receiving his Associate Degree in Nursing in 2015, Millsap transferred to Eastern Illinois University where he earned a bachelor's degree.

"I always wanted to further my education," Millsap said.
"My family was going to breakfast at St. Mary-of-the-Woods and as we were driving down the tree-lined road I just had this feeling I need to go to school here."

That experience prompted him to enroll in St. Mary's Master of Leadership Development Program, which he completed in August 2019. The innovative, interdisciplinary program assists business, non-profit and public sector professionals to develop the leadership and technical skills necessary to advance in their careers while successfully guiding an organization into the future.

"It's a very broad, long-term degree," Millsap said. "What-

ever I decide to do in the future, I will be able to use it."

Millsap joined Carle Richland Memorial Hospital in 2015. He started as a floor nurse and served as a medical/surgery nurse for a year. He then worked in the Intensive Care Unit before taking his current position, which he has held for two years.

"I think the different perspectives of the floor really helped me as nurse coordinator," he said. "I got an understanding of each department and what they go through. Each is as different as they are similar."

One of his favorite aspects of the job is interacting with others.

"I enjoy meeting new people and learning their stories," he said. "Everyone has a unique story. Nursing gets you more involved in the community and makes you think more about the world around you. We see poverty first hand, people without insurance

and the impact of the opioid crisis. Everything you see in the headlines, you see first hand as a nurse."

Millsap said the IECC/OCC Nursing Program prepared him well and laid the groundwork for his success.

"What I liked most about the program is the group atmosphere it fosters," he said. "You get to know your classmates and it feels like a family. In grad school, I felt more alone. I also loved the instructors. I still keep in contact with Anne Hustad. I absolutely would recommend the program to other people. Most of the people I work with also went through the program and they are all doing well."

Millsap encourages others to consider entering the nursing profession.

"If people are thinking about going into nursing, they should jump in and explore it," he added. "Everyone will help you get through the process, you just need to do it. There is a shortage of nurses and we need passionate people. There are people ready to help you. If you are a good-hearted person who wants to help others, they will teach you the rest."
