Olney Central College GED graduate Bill Lamb is the recipient of the Illinois Adult and Continuing Educators Association's Student of the Year Award.

"I'm really surprised and excited about it," said Lamb. "I just want to thank the teachers and staff for all of their help. It's a really good program and more people need to take advantage of it. I especially want to thank instructor Maranda Tate. She really pushed me to do more and better."

Lamb, of Noble, was honored during the annual IACEA banquet, where he received both a plaque and a monetary award.

"This is a huge honor and I am so proud of Bill," said OCC Learning Skills Center Director Donita Kaare. "He is a wonderful success story because of

his own efforts, but also because of the excellent instruction and support he received at OCC."

Lamb enrolled in the free GED test preparation classes offered through Olney Central College's Learning Skills Center in Spring 2013 after losing his job.

"For years, my wife, Linda, encouraged me to go back to school and get my degree," he said. "I want to thank God and I really want to thank my wife because she got me there in the first place." his GED, Lamb provided both support and encouragement to his classmates.

"Bill is a wonderful mentor to younger students who are struggling," said Jessica Parrent, who worked with Lamb while serving as Illinois Eastern Community Colleges' Adult Education Transition/Data Technician. "He succeeded in the classroom and helped a number of other students."

While preparing for his GED, Lamb also participated in the Learning Skills Center's Transition Skills Class. The course assists students as they transition from GED classes to college courses or the job market. "This will allow our students to share their talents regionally, hear other quality jazz ensembles and visit the campus of a highly-ranked regional university." The University of Evansville is currently ranked No. 9 on the U.S. News & World Report "Best Regional Universities: Midwest" listing.

The OCC Jazz Ensemble will be performing the music of George Gershwin and Gordon Goodwin's *Big Phat Band*, among others.

OCC Music Department to present Spring Concert April 17

The Olney Central College Music Department will present its Spring Concert at 7:30 p.m. on Friday, April 17 in the Dr. John D. Stull Performing Arts Center. This concert will feature the OCC Concert Band, Concert Choir and Jazz Ensemble.

The Concert Band will be theming their portion of the concert "Love and Determination" with selections themed around rising above the struggles that one encounters through life. *The Phoenix*, by Gary P. Gilroy begins the concert "rising from the ashes." Eric Whitacre's *The Seal Lullaby* pays tribute to the devotion of a parent's love; and *A Spirit Unconquered* by Dallas Burke celebrates the spirit of those who face challenges to not only endure, but thrive.

The Concert Choir will perform Carissimi's *Historia di Jephte*, an early Lenten Oratorio taken from Judges 11. Carissimi's setting pioneers many devices that would become the hallmarks of the Oratorio form, inspiring future composers such as Handel and Bach. The work features full chorus, a trio, duets and solos. Additionally, the Concert Choir will perform an African American Spiritual, a touch of Broadway and a Beatles song.

The Jazz Ensemble will break into four separate jazz combos for this concert, letting each student develop their improvisational skills through hits of yesterday and new music of today.

Two combos will play the music of Horace Silver, one will pay homage to Herbie Hancock and a fourth will play a new piece by Nicholas Fernandez called *Transcendental Tango*.

Admission is \$5 and available at the door.

Wristbands for Olney Central College's Jamfest will go on sale Monday, April 13.

The wristbands are just \$5 and provide entry to all five shows during the April 18 music festival. Wristbands may be purchased from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. April 13 through April 15 outside the Student Services Office; from 9 a.m. to noon during the OCC and IDES Hiring Exposition in the Gym; and from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. at Spring Fling.

Wristbands also will be available at the gate the day of Jamfest. The event will be held in the parking lot closest to the Student Services Office. Parking will be available in the freshman lot, which may be entered from Ill. 130.

Attendees should wait until entering the venue before applying the wristbands. In the event Jamfest is canceled due to rain, refunds will be given only to those who present wristbands in pristine condition.

Jamfest kicks off at noon as The Thinga-Ma Jug Band brings its brand of mountain music to the stage followed by the classic country sounds of MotherLode at 2 p.m.

Bad Daddies will offer a mix of classic rock and pop at 4 p.m. and the evening will conclude with alternative and rock performers Sidelined at 6 p.m. and Flight Fifty at 8 p.m.

Alldredge said each band will play about a 90-minute set with a 15minute intermission between the shows.

Food and drinks will be available for purchase with a percentage of the profits going to OCC organizations. Free games will be set up and the college also will hold prize giveaways.

Those attending should bring lawn chairs or blankets. No alcohol or outside food or drinks will be allowed on college grounds.

Olney Central College instructor Carmen Jones attended the 13th annual conference of the National Association of Community College Teacher Education Programs (NACCTEP) held March 6-8 in Boston, Mass.

NACCTEP is an organization of community colleges, administrators, staff, faculty and students. Its mission is leading community college early childhood and teacher education programs for the 21st century.

The annual conference brings together leaders in teacher education programs from community colleges across the nation to share programs, lessons and models to revolutionize teacher education programs and to develop pathways and partnerships with senior institutions, communities and industries in education.

The theme of this year's conference was "Revolutionizing Community College Teacher Education Programs."

"This is the first time that I

have attended the conference. I really enjoyed the experience," Jones said. "Most of the break out sessions that I attended centered on early childhood education. During the past year, I have been working on revising and enhancing the education curriculum at Olney Central College, primarily developing new courses in early childhood education. I gained greater insight on what other community colleges across the country, and especially at other community colleges in Illinois, are doing in early childhood education."

NACCTEP serves as a voice for community colleges in national discussions about teacher education; supports institutions and individual members by enhancing current community college teacher education programs and is a resource for those looking to develop new programs; and facilitates connections between community college teacher education programs and faculty.

Foundation Golf Outing


The OCC Foundation will host its 14th annual golf outing on Friday, May 1 at the Richland Country Club in Olney.



"During this time, Mathias has applied himself with German efficiency becoming well known for his diligence and precision," Shimkus said. "Mathias has shown why the German economy prides itself on its efficiency as our office could not have asked for more dedication in whatever task he was assigned."


Shimkus noted the exchange programs, strengthen and preserve the relationships shared between countries.
