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Welding students earn two awards at competition

Olney Central College's Welding and Cutting Program captured team and individual awards during the seventh annual David Nuckols Memorial Invitational Welding Competition in Owensboro, Ky.

Maverick Fisher and Derek Rice's combined efforts earned the college a place among the competition's top-ranked schools with OCC finishing third overall. Fisher, of Flora, also placed third on the academic portion of the test.

"It was good not only for us, but the school too," said Rice, of Ste. Marie. "It shows what a good job Curtis Marshall does in teaching us what we need to learn. It is good to show those who are interested in the program what we

can do."

Fisher added, "It felt great. I'm so happy I was able to bring back the awards for the program." Horn Industrial Services sponsors the event, which allows students enrolled in secondary and post-secondary welding programs to demonstrate their skills in SMAW, FCAW and GTAW welding processes. Rice and Fisher were among 20 students from 10 Tri-State area schools who participated in the Jan. 17 contest.

The students had to set up their machines and perform welding tasks within a one-hour time limit. Judges then assessed each contestant's mastery of welding knowledge and skills. The students also completed a 100-question written test, which covered general knowledge of welding processes and procedures.

OCC grad working as chiropractor in Nashville

For Dr. Jesse Riley, the path from high school student to working in one of Nashville, Tenn.'s leading chiropractic centers began at Olney Central College.

The Olney native took summer classes at OCC and was impressed by the Science and Pre-Medicine programs.

"The faculty was probably the biggest reason I chose OCC," Riley said. "OCC offered a greater opportunity to get to know my teachers. They are really personable and help you in any way they can. They make sure you understand the material and that you are learning. They were always going above and beyond."

He added, "I chose OCC because it felt like the right fit for me. It provided an easier transition from high school than going to a bigger school. It also made me a more diligent student and prepared me for the next step."

Riley completed his associate's degree at OCC in 2006 and transferred to Southern Illinois University at Edwardsville.

"I knew I wanted to be in the medical field, but as an undergraduate I didn't know if I wanted to be a medical doctor, a physical therapist or a

IECC Alerts will automatically go to your Entrata email account, but you can opt-in for text messages or receive messages at another email account.

To do so, login to Entrata

(entrata.iecc.edu) and select Emergency Alerts. Enter your cellular information under the Text and Voice Preferences section. A phone number is required. The Cellular Provider is optional.

You also may enter another email address in the Email Preferences area under Contact Email. Then Save.

While there is no direct cost for signing up for this text message service, you may be charged a text message fee by your cell phone provider.

Please check your cell phone plan to understand the costs you may incur using this service.

The system will be used to send text messages related to campus emergencies, weather-related closures and test messages.

Students previously signed up with IECC Emergency Alerts should verify contact information and preferences are current.





After completing his bachelor's degree in biomedical sciences, Riley chose to attend Logan University in St. Louis and begin a master's degree in Sports Science and Rehabilitation.

During his graduate studies, Riley had an opportunity to shadow both chiropractors and medical doctors.

"The chiropractors I worked with really resonated with me," he said. "They had the same idea for care and treatment I did."

Riley completed his master's degree in 2012 and decided to pursue a Doctor of Chiropractic Degree at Logan University. While working on his doctorate studies, Riley attended several seminars, which led to an invitation from one presenter to work with him at a large sports medical clinic in Beverly Hills, Calif. During the yearlong internship, Riley treated a variety of patients including Olympic athletes.

Riley completed his studies in December 2013. He joined the Active Spine and Joint Center in July, where he has been working with Dr. Jason Hulme, a leading Nashville chiropractor.

"I really enjoy the experience and my boss is amazing," Riley said. "Every day is different. I like the challenge not only of treating a patient, but pinpointing the cause of their problem. It is like unraveling a mystery. Every day you have to put the puzzle together. You put on your Sherlock Holmes hat and try to figure out why a person came in with pain." In his work, Riley performs chiropractic manipulations while also concentrating on functional movement and biomechanics for the improvement of the patient's life and for preventative purposes.

"Knowing you are able to change people's lives for the better because they are out of pain and exercising or getting to pick up their grandkids is great," he added.

Riley said OCC and its faculty were instrumental in helping him to reach his career goal.

"I was really happy with my experience at OCC," he said. "It prepared me well. The faculty was great. If you had a question, you could always feel free to ask them. If anyone has the opportunity to go to OCC, they should take advantage of it."

Mary Corry receives certification

Mary Corry, coordinator of Allied Health Support and Development at OCC, received her certification last month from the Age Management Medicine Group.

Corry has been working on her age management certification for two and a half years and is the first registered nurse to earn the AMMG designation. Previously, only medical doctors had completed the age management training, which focuses on exercise, diet, supplementation and hormone replacement therapy.

"I'm really ecstatic about it," Corry said of receiving her certification. "It opens more doors for me in age management."

Last summer Corry served as a moderator during the West Virginia Wellness Symposium discussing age management and how it has positively impacted her life through the Cenegenics program.

experience," Rice said. "I like how difficult it was. The welds weren't the easiest to do. I'm a little competitive and I like putting myself up against others. I like to show what I can do."

Instructor Curtis Marshall said this is only the second time OCC students have participated in the event.

"I'm very happy with both of them," he said. "I spoke with the Certified Welding Inspectors who graded their tests and they both did exceptionally well compared to the rest of the students. This was a great opportunity for them. These are the same tests the company uses to hire people and they gave the students an idea of what they can expect when applying for a job."

Marshall also praised Rice and Fisher for their dedication and hard work in preparing for the competition.

"They put in a lot of time practic-

> ing," he said. "They came in after class and during Winter Break to make sure they were ready."

Fisher and Rice both have previous experience in welding competitions. As a junior and senior, Rice participated at the state level in an FFA welding contest, placing second overall. During his senior year, Fisher competed at the Tulsa School of Welding in Oklahoma.

As participants, Rice and Fisher received several gifts including 100 pounds of Lincoln Electric E-7018-H4Rx1/8 welding electrodes, a Victor Cutmaster Torch Kit, \$100 in gift cards and a Titan Industrial folding chair.

"I'm very proud of the students," Marshall added. "They have great opportunities ahead of them. After they finish the program, the possibilities are endless. They are really good students."
