## **Hustad selected as Nurse Educator Fellow**

The Illinois Board of Higher Education has selected Olney Central College Instructor Anne Hustad, MSN, RN, CNE, as a Nurse Educator Fellow.

Hustad was one of 19 distinguished educators from across the state chosen to take part in the Nurse Educator Fellowship Program.

"I am honored to have been selected," Hustad said. "I really want to thank Associate Dean of Nursing and Allied Health Theresa Marcotte for nominating me."

Now in its 10th year, the competitive program's purpose is to ensure the retention of well-qualified nursing fac-



ulty at institutions of higher education that award nursing degrees.

"With a master's degree in nursing, you can earn more as a nurse practitioner than you can as an educator," Hustad said. "The program promotes nursing education by providing a salary stipend to participants."

Fellows may use the funds to pay for professional development, conference expenses, continued education and professional dues.

Hustad plans to pursue a doctor of nursing practice degree and will utilize her stipend to assist with related costs.

Hustad and the other recipients will be honored during an awards ceremony in June.

"We will receive our certificates and at that time present reports on how we are



# **Barnes new Collision Repair Instructor**

Lonnie Barnes, of Greenup, has joined Olney Central College as its new Collision Repair Technology instructor.

A graduate of the program, he brings more than 28 years of auto body experience to the classroom. Barnes served as an adjunct instructor at OCC during the fall semester and had previously been employed at Probst Auto Body. During his career, Barnes has worked as a body and refinish technician, office manager and production manager at various shops. He also holds a number of industry-related certifications.

"I like the contact with the students and being able to give them the knowledge they need to succeed," Barnes said. "Learning is something ongoing. It doesn't stop when you begin teaching or working in a shop. You have to keep current."



Teaching is a natural fit for Barnes. A longtime member of the Greenup Fire Department, he serves as an explorer advisor training and assisting the department's junior members.

"I always enjoyed passing my knowledge on to them and that has extended to the Collision Repair Program," he added.

Barnes sees an overwhelming need for collision repair and other technical programs which can provide students with the skills needed to enter the workforce without a four-year degree.

"I feel there isn't enough emphasis on technical programs," he said. "Our industry has suffered for a lack of qualified technicians. The last job I was at it took eight or nine months before we were able to hire someone."

Barnes added, "Olney is one of only a few collision repair programs in the area. I chose to become an instructor because I want to see it go forward. Collision repair is a good field to get into and make a good living."

Before attending OCC, Barnes worked in a factory.

"I didn't like it," he said. "I always liked working with cars and one morning while driving to work I decided to go to school for collision repair."

Barnes encourages anyone interested in the Collision Repair Technology Program to contact him.

# Register now for Concealed Carry Class April 12-14

Individuals interested in obtaining an Illinois Concealed Carry permit are encouraged to enroll in an upcoming course at OCC.

The Concealed Carry class provides 16 hours of required firearms training, including classroom and range instruction.

During the course, participants will receive instruction on how to safely handle a handgun while honing their marksman skills. They also will learn how to survive a real-world encounter and to maintain the proper mindset, skills and abilities that come with "bearing arms" for the purpose of self-defense. The course is designed for both the beginner and experienced shooter.

The class will meet from 6 to 10 p.m. on Thursday, April 12 and Friday, April 13 at OCC. On Saturday, April 14, the class will be held from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. at the Olney Gun Range.

Tuition and fees for the class are \$175 for residents of the Illinois Eastern Community Colleges District, and must be paid in advance to reserve a seat in the course. Tuition is waived for residents of the IECC District who are age 60 and older, but course fees must be paid. To register, call 395-7777.



# Students practice etiquette and interviewing skills

The TRIO Student Support Services Program hopes to make future interviews and business luncheons less intimidating for its participants by providing them with the opportunity to practice their skills at a recent workshop.

"A lot of students today are not as prepared as they could be for an interview," said Wain Davis, Director of TRIO Student Support Services. "It's a very valuable skill for our students that they need to have before they graduate so they can compete in a competitive job market."

Hosted at OCC, the workshop brought together 29 students from Frontier, Lincoln Trail, Olney Central and

Wabash Valley colleges, which are served by TRIO SSS at Illinois Eastern Community Colleges.

The program included a presentation on interviewing and basic formal etiquette. Students then attended a business-style luncheon with 10 community guests.

"It gave them a chance to go through the interview process while making use of the information we gave them on table etiquette," Davis added.

After lunch, students participated in speed interviews.

"The students had 30 to 35 seconds to introduce themselves to another student, who then asked them a question," Davis said. "The student had to formulate an answer quickly. It teaches them how to think on their feet."

Afterward, students had an opportunity to debrief and discuss the questions they found problematic.

Participants finished the day learning to compose thank you notes.





"Each student wrote a note to a guest they sat with at the luncheon. Writing thank you notes is becoming a lost art," Davis said. "Sending a thank you note when no one else is doing it, can help you stand out in the pack. It might be the catalyst that gets you called back for another interview."

Richard Marrero said the workshop provided valuable insights he will continue to utilize long after graduating from OCC.

"I thought I personally learned a lot sitting at the dinner table," he said. "It was great being able to take what we learned in the presentation and put it to use. I knew table etiquette, but I didn't know it in depth. It is something I will be able to use in the future. It was a great experience."

The event is the third in a series of four workshops TRIO will present for participants during the academic year. Other programs have included a mini college fair and a financial aid completion day. The final workshop will focus on stress relief.

Davis is thrilled with the response from the most recent program.

"It was a good day and we had a lot of positive feedback," Davis said. "We are already looking for ways to improve it next year."

TRIO SSS is a 100 percent federally funded program, with a current funding level at \$308,638. The program offers tutoring, academic and career advisement, study skills enhancement and special enrichment programs.
