OCC's Fitness Center is cutting its membership fees in half - just in time for the holidays.



Student Advantage Network is part of the TRiO program at IECC, which is funded by the U.S.

Department of Education. Its goal is to help participants stay in college, graduate and successfully transfer to a four-year college or university. SAN provides transfer assistance, free tutoring, peer mentoring, job shadowing, financial aid planning; referral service and cultural experiences and free campus visits.

"I really love working one-on-one with the students," Stroughmatt said. "I love to encourage them and to help them to open their minds as

they make the transition from high school student to adult life in college. My job is to help them with anything that relates to their college experience and their future. Each student presents a different set of circumstances. The variety is a big part of what I love."

Stroughmatt earned a bachelor's degree in University Studies from Southern Illinois University at Carbondale.

"I'm one of only a few people who holds the degree," she said. "It's a unique degree, which allows you to take course work in a variety of interests. My main area of interest is psychology with a focus in anthropology and French."

Stroughmatt said her non-traditional college experiences, which include beginning her studies at age 23, are an asset in working with the students.

"I understand their experiences and what students worry about, being young and sometimes undecided on their futures," she said.

Stroughmatt wants students to realize that they can pursue many interests and their educational journey isn't restricted to a single path or single outcome.

Stroughmatt hopes to increase awareness about SAN and the opportunities it offers to both students and the community. She also wants to increase student members' involvement in the community.

"I'd like to see the program grow," she said. "I'd like to see all students on campus have an understanding of what the program is, so even if they don't meet the requirements they can recommend it to friends and other students."

To be eligible, participants must be transfer degree-seeking students. They also must meet one of the following criteria: be a first-generation college student, fall within the low-to moderate-income guidelines or have a disability that affects learning. # Mobile Vet Center assists veterans at OCC

The Department of Veterans Affairs' Mobile Vet Center stopped at Olney Central College on Nov. 8 to assist students and other local veterans of combat zones.

The high-tech mobile service center helps veterans as they readjust to civilian life. The center offers individual, family and group counseling while providing information on other benefits for veterans and their families at no cost.

Counselor Justin Anweiler said around 30 veterans visited the center during its stop in Olney. Anweiler, a former OCC student, also met with faculty and staff to discuss how they can encourage and assist veterans as they return to school after active duty. Anweiler has spent 18 years with the military, serving with the Navy and later the Army Reserves. He has been working with the Mobile Vet Center for eight months.

"I enjoy the face-to-face outreach with other veterans," he said.

Region 2 Mobile Vet Center Coordinator David Cozart said the MVC's goal is to reach underserved veteran populations in the nation's rural areas.

"The Veterans Administration is trying to make it easier for veterans," said Cozart, an Army veteran who served two tours of duty in Iraq. "Some veterans have to drive four or five hours for services. Now we're coming to them. They can come out and get their questions answered and it's much better for them."

Internet satellite and an onboard generator enable the Mobile Vet Center counselors to have real-time access to the veteran's VA records on a secure system. A video conferencing system allows face-to-face visits

between the veteran and a Veterans Affairs Medical Center health provider. The MVC also includes two confidential counseling areas and a waiting room.

"I think it's awesome that I can help someone else," Cozart said. "This is vet helping vet. It's rewarding to talk to other veterans and tell them what benefits are available and to help them maximize those. This is one of the most valuable tools the VA has."

The Illinois Community College



Board has partnered with the Springfield Veterans Center to bring the mobile unit and its staff to the state's 39 community college districts during the next two years.

# Radiography Club collecting items for the Ronald McDonald Houses

The OCC Radiography Club is collecting items to help the Ronald McDonald Houses of Metro St. Louis.

Many families travel far from home to receive treatment for their seriously ill or injured children. Often it can be a long time to be away from home, or to divide a family.

The Ronald McDonald Houses provide a "home away from home" for families so they can stay close by their hospitalized child at little or no cost. Fiftynine families stay in the St. Louis Metro Houses each night.

The houses rely on Wish List item donations to keep the facilities running. Wish List items the Radiography Club is collecting include pre-packaged, single-serve snack foods such as cookies, soup, mac 'n' cheese, breakfast bars, hot chocolate, trail mix, dried fruit and peanut butter, or cheese sandwich crackers; dishwasher detergent; liquid hand soap in a pump container; small and large trash can liners; dish soap; and Ziploc baggies, all sizes.

Other needed items include fabric softener sheets, laundry detergent (high-efficiency only), disinfectant spray, Soft Scrub and Febreze, batteries of all sizes, 60-watt light bulbs, hand sanitizer in a

pump container, razors, toothpaste, toothbrushes and trial-sized deodorant.

In addition, the houses can use queen and twin sheet sets (white only) and towels, hand towels and wash clothes (white only). Adult-sized men's and women's scrubs and sweats are also needed.

Donations of Target and Schnucks gift cards as well as adult board games such as Cranium and Trivial Pursuit also will be accepted.

Donations may be placed in the collection boxes located at both entrances to Wattleworth Hall. Donations will be accepted through Dec. 13.
