
# OCC Theatre to present 'Seussical'

# SAN hosts Mardi Gras concert Feb. 12

Olney Central College's Student Advantage Network will host a Mardi Gras concert featuring Dennis Stroughmatt et L'Esprit Creole on Sunday, Feb. 12.

This unique acoustical group performs the traditional music of the French Creoles who settled Illinois and other parts of what was Old Upper Louisiana more than 300 years ago. A vibrant blend of Celtic, Canadian and Old Time sounds, this music bridges the gap between contemporary Canadian and Louisiana Cajun styles. The group has been performing across the country for 15 years.

A native of Southern Illinois, Stroughmatt began exploring the French Creole culture as a young college student. He forged relationships with their descendants immersing himself in the old French language, culture and music of the land which became part of the United States following the Louisiana Purchase. Local Creole fiddlers Roy Boyer and Charlie Pashia taught Stroughmatt to play fiddle in the tradition of their fathers. Stroughmatt has become an adopted son of the French Midwest Creoles living along the Mississippi River near St. Louis.

With the blessing of the Creole people of the Midwest, Stroughmatt et L'Esprit Creole are its passionate ambassadors, expanding interest and excitement in a region that has been in many ways ignored by the history books.

Stroughmatt is joined on stage by Robert Russell, of Carbondale, and two musicians with Creole ancestry, his wife, Jennifer Stroughmatt, who

# Join the Organ/Tissue Donor Registry

Olney Central College is encouraging individuals to join the Illinois Organ/Tissue Donor Registry and save the lives of thousands of people who may be waiting for a transplant.

According to the Secretary of State's Office nearly 5,000 people in Illinois are currently on the organ transplant waiting list. More than 300 Illinoisans die each year before receiving transplants.

Nationally, more than 110,000 people are waiting for a transplant and every 11 minutes a new person is added to the waiting list. An estimated one in 20 Americans will need some type of medical tissue transplant during their lifetimes.



There is a tremendous need across the United States for organ/tissue donors and this is your chance to get involved.

April is national Donate Life Month and OCC is partnering with the Secretary of State's Organ/Tissue Donor Program to host an organ donation registry drive Friday, March 30 through Thursday, April 5. Students, faculty and staff are invited to stop by informational tables and add their names to the registry. The Student Nurses' Association, which is helping to organize the event, has set a goal of 50 new donors.

All information is confidential and only released to authorized personnel after all efforts to save a person have failed and death has been declared.

Illinois has one of the

most successful state registries in the country, with more than 5 million participants. The Illinois Organ/Tissue Donor Registry is unique in that it utilizes the state's driver's license database at no additional cost to taxpayers.

Almost 50 percent of those who visit a driver's license facility join the registry.

If you didn't sign up as an organ or tissue donor at that time or were unable to due so because of age restrictions, this is your opportunity to participate and show that Donors Live Longer.

# **Cutchin defends dissertation**

Olney Central College Dean of Instruction Jeffery Cutchin successfully defended his dissertation on Jan. 24

Cutchin will receive his Ph.D. in Education with a specialization in Community College and Higher Education Leadership from Walden University.

Cutchin began work on his doctorate in February 2007. His dissertation focused on adjunct faculty.

"My dissertation is a qualitative study and exploration in the culture of the adjunct such as why do they teach and what's important to them," he said.

Literature indicates there is a national dissatisfaction

among adjunct faculty.

"My intention was to investigate the culture and to learn as much as I could about the adjunct culture so other researches after me can look at these areas of dissatisfaction."

Cutchin joined OCC as Dean of Instruction in September. Before coming to OCC, Cutchin was the Assistant Dean of Student Services at Frontier Community College, where he oversaw financial aid, registration and records and advisement.

He previously served as FCC's Coordinator of Instructional Services and was responsible for creating the college schedule as well as managing faculty. Cutchin was a full-time information systems and geology instructor at FCC for more than seven years.

Cutchin earned a bachelor's degree in geology from Southern Illinois
University and holds a master's degree in teaching with a specialization in information technology from Webster University.

The colorful characters transport us from the Jungle of Nool to the Circus McGurkus to the invisible world of Whos.

The story centers around Horton the Elephant, who finds himself faced with a double challenge — not only must he protect his tiny friend Jojo and all the invisible Whos from a world of naysayers and dangers, but he must guard an abandoned egg

left to his care by the irresponsible Mayzie La Bird. Although Horton faces ridicule, danger, kidnapping and a trial, the intrepid Gertrude McFuzz never loses faith in him, the only one who recognizes "his kind and his powerful heart." 

# OCC emergency alerts

Illinois Eastern Community Colleges has contracted with e2Campus to provide alert notification services.

The system will notify students and employees of campus emergencies and closures by e-mail and/or cell phone text message. Log onto Entrata and click on the alerts link to activate an account.

IECC Alerts is an opt-in service. While there is no direct cost for signing up for the service, you may be charged a text message fee by your cell phone provider.

Please check your cell phone plan to understand the costs you may incur using the service.

The system will be used to send text mes-

sages related to campus emergencies. weatherrelated closures, test messages



and notifications when accounts are about to expire.

Unfortunately, SMS text alerts are not currently working with the Alltel carrier.

# Medical Coding informational meeting

Olney Central College will host an informational meeting for its Medical Coding Associate Certificate from 3:30 to 4:30 p.m. on Thursday, Feb. 16 in the OCC Banquet Room.

This is a great opportunity to learn more about the program, its requirements and to meet Medical Office Instructors Amie Mayhall and Shasta Bennett.

This three-semester program prepares students to work as medical coding professionals. Coders are responsible for translating health-care providers' diagnostic and procedural phrases into coded form. Coding professionals do this by reviewing and analyzing health records to identify relevant diagnoses and procedures for distinct patient encounters.

Medical coding professionals work in a variety of healthcare settings, including inpatient and outpatient healthcare and for non-providers such as the insurance industry and healthcare software vendors. Medical coding also offers higher wages and more employability than other medical office positions.

According to the American Health Information Management Association, there is currently a nationwide shortage of certified medical coders in hospitals, physician practices and other healthcare facilities.

Students are admitted to the program in the fall. Space is limited and students are accepted on a first-come, first-served basis.
