Foundation provides funding for websites

The Olney Central College Music Department is unveiling two new websites to promote activities in the arts throughout the region.

The OCC Foundation donated funding for the websites' development in honor of Bob Ferguson, who served 12 years on its Executive Board before leaving this past July.

"The Foundation is very appreciative of Bob's service on the Executive Board and the difference he made for the college and its students," said OCC Foundation President Deborah Mitchell. "The Board wants to recognize Bob and express our appreciation through this donation."

The first website www.occmusic.org features information about upcoming performances, audition dates and requirements and course offerings, as well as interviews with faculty, students and community members sharing their thoughts about their experiences in the OCC Music Department.

Information Systems Technology Program added

Olney Central College will offer a new Information Systems Technology Program beginning this fall.

"Speaking with the students, we felt like there was a real need for a computer information program," said OCC Dean of Instruction Dr. Jeffery Cutchin. "We responded to and addressed that need by developing the IST degree and certificate."

The program will prepare students to handle the

day-to-day operations of the computer-related activities for a business and an organization's information systems. Students who complete the program will be able to both support and maintain computer hardware as well as software programs. Local Area Networks, Wide Area Networks and Wireless Networks also are addressed.

"It is definitely hands-on and deals with both hardware and software so the

individual learns how to physically work on and replace hard drives and maintain computers as well as connect computers to a network," Cutchin said.

The classes will be offered in the evenings, which will enable students to continue working while they complete their training.

Students enrolled in the IST Program can earn either a one-year certificate or a two-year associate's

degree. Those who complete the degree will be able to transfer to Southern Illinois University at Carbondale and finish their bachelor's degrees either on campus or through SIU's online program.

"I explicitly worked closely with SIU at Carbondale to ensure the program would transfer," Cutchin said. "The idea is that a student can come here for two years, find

Olney Central College and Youth for Understanding (YFU) offer area residents the opportunity to welcome the world home.



Marianne's mentor describes her as an open-minded, communicative young woman. Friendships and social activities are important to Marianne and will play a key role in her experience of studying abroad.




Leonie

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Students complete Certification as Medical Office Assistants

Five Olney Central College students recently received their certification as Medical Office Assistants.

Dawn Campbell and Stefanie Bayles of Olney, Jo McGlothlin of Newton, Nichole Evans of Robinson and Katherine Rogers of Fort Wayne, Ind., all passed the National Center for Competency Testing's Certified Medical Office Assistant Exam, which is offered at OCC.

The test covers medical office procedures, medical insurance and billing, basic clinical responsibilities, medical and legal foundations and medical terminology. NCCT is an independent certification organization that has tested more than 240,000 individuals throughout the United States since 1989.

Instructor Amie Mayhall said the students, who recently completed OCC's Medical Office Assistant Program, did very well on the tests

with one individual receiving an overall score of 93 out of 100.

Mayhall was especially pleased with the students' outcome on the medical terminology portion of the exam as all five earned scores in the 90s.

"Shasta (Bennett) and I are really proud of the students and wish them luck as they begin their careers," Mayhall said.

According to the NCCT, many physicians' offices and health care clinics are now looking for certified office professionals.

While the testing is optional for OCC's Medical Office Assistant students, Mayhall said those who earn the certification can increase their employment opportunities and earning potentials.

"The certification really does set them apart from others in the field," she said. "It demonstrates that graduates carry with them the required

knowledge for positions in the field of study."

OCC became an approved testing site for the NCCT exam in 2009 and as such can proctor the tests as well as order review books and practice tests for students. Of the four Illinois Eastern Community Colleges, OCC is the only one to offer NCCT certification testing.

OCC's Medical Office Assistant Degree is designed for students who wish to work as medical office assistants, medical transcriptionists or medical receptionists as well as those who will be working as coders and billers.

Walmart awards grant to TRiO Upward Bound

The Walmart Foundation recently selected the Illinois Eastern Community Colleges TRiO Upward Bound program to receive a grant through its Local Community Contribution Program. Upward Bound - West, located at Olney Central College, received a \$2,500 grant from the Olney Walmart. The grant money will be used to provide essential items necessary for college-bound seniors to be successful in post-secondary education.

TRiO Upward Bound is a college preparatory program, which is 100 percent federally funded through the Department of Education. It is designed to provide academic support, counseling and cultural enrichment to high school students who desire academic success in both secondary and post-secondary education.

The program provides assistance to low-income, first-generation (neither parent having earned a bachelor's degree) and/or high school students demonstrating academic need.

Application for admission to the IECC TRiO Upward Bound program is open to students in a specific target area which includes, Crawford, Edwards, Jasper, Lawrence, Richland and Wayne counties. The Upward Bound program currently serves a total of 140 students at eight local high schools. Upward Bound - West serves students at the East Richland, Edwards County,

employment and continue to work while they finish their bachelor's degrees. It's important for some of our students to be able to do that."

Through the program, IST students also will be able to earn important IT certifications. Students in the certificate and associate's degree programs can complete their Comp TIA A+ and Comp TIA Network+ certifications. In addition, degree-seeking students can receive certifications in MCSA: Windows 8 and MSCA: Windows Server.

Cutchin said a number of job opportunities will be available for IST graduates. With its diverse courses and certifications, the program will make graduates

highly marketable and prepare them for employment as computer software engineers, network engineers, database administrators, hardware engineers, e-mail administrators and even entry-level programmers or web administrators.

"This program prepares students for virtually any entry-level position in the information technology field," he added.


