Collision Repair Technology Center groundbreaking

The Illinois Capital Development Board (CDB) and Olney Central College officials broke ground May 21 on the \$1.1 million Collision Repair Technology Center at OCC.

Funded by Governor Pat Quinn's Illinois Jobs Now! construction program, the project is part of his commitment to creating jobs and improving Illinois' economy. The project will be overseen by the CDB, the state's construction management agency.

"Olney Central College is an educational hub for Eastern Illinois, and this new center will help them offer more opportunities for students to train for in-demand careers," CDB Director Jim Underwood said. "The project will also employ a number of construction workers, which will drive the local economy forward."

"The four colleges of the IECC system all benefit from this new construction. Students from throughout the district will use this building," Terry Bruce, chief executive officer of the four-college Illinois Eastern Community Colleges system, said. "Governor Quinn knows the importance of community colleges to a vibrant

Illinois future. Senator Dale Righter and Representative David Reis have consistently supported IECC and all the community colleges in the area. We thank them for their work and thank Governor Quinn for this new building."

"This building will add value to the college's effort to train students for the jobs here in Southeastern Illinois," Olney Central College President Rodney Ranes said.

"When added to our existing buildings containing auto repair, welding and industrial maintenance, this new building improves the college's ability to exceed the training needs of our career and technical students and will have a significant impact on the student experience in the classroom."

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OCC Radiography Program receives eight-year accreditation

The Olney Central College Radiography Program has been awarded an eight-year accreditation from the Joint Review Committee on Education in Radiologic Technology.

"We are very happy to receive this," said Radiography Director Carol Kocher. "It is good to receive that acknowledgement and to get that stamp of approval. The idea of accreditation is to make sure the program is always improving and we are continually looking for ways to become better. Everyone benefits from

that."

The Radiography
Program originally
received a five-year
accreditation in 2013 following a site visit. At that
time, JRCERT officials
noted the accreditation
could be extended if a few
minor recommendations

were implemented.

Kocher, Clinical Coordinator Lisa Rauch and Associate Dean of Nursing and Allied Health Tammy Fralicker worked together to implement the changes, which included revisions to a few specific

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OCC adds HR and Office Administration programs

Olney Central College has added two new degrees and a certificate to its Office Preparation Programs.

Beginning this fall, students can complete a Human Resource Assistant Degree or an Office Administration Certificate and Degree.

The two-year HR program prepares students for entry-level jobs in the Human Resource field performing tasks such as maintaining employee files and managing worker compensation and benefits, as well as providing employee training and managing staff.

Through their coursework, students will explore how HR professionals develop and attract employees, handle disputes, conduct discipline and interact with a variety of people in various work settings.

Instructor Amie Mayhall noted the program can benefit small business owners and those already working in the field who wish to develop and enhance their HR skills.

"We see a real need for this type of program in the community," Mayhall said. "With the increasing ethical and legal demands, even entry-level HR employees require training in the field. We have instructors who are passionate in the field of HR. We are very excited that Tara Buerster, the Director of Human Resources for Illinois Eastern Community Colleges, will be teaching the legal aspects of HR."

Other instructors include Shasta Bennett, who holds a master's degree in Global Human Resource Management from the University of Illinois, and Mayhall, who has a Master of Business Administration Degree.

During the course of the program, Mayhall said students will utilize HR software programs which provide real-life scenarios.

"We also have established internship opportunities for the students which will

give them the hands-on experience they need," she said.

Through the one- and two-year Office
Administration programs, students will attain the skills needed for utilizing office technology, creating presentations, developing databases, designing newsletters, setting up telephone and web conferences and creating spread-sheets.

Students will study Microsoft Office applications including word processing, spreadsheets, databases, desktop publishing and other communication technologies. In addition, they will take Microsoft certification exams in Word, Excel and Access.

"The program qualifies graduates for entry-level office positions and can lead to supervisory positions," Mayhall said.

Office Administration provides a course of study devoted entirely to preparing students to work in a general office setting, which Mayhall says will fill a need within the community.

Mayhall noted the certificate's curriculum is the same as the first-year coursework for the Human Resource Assistant Degree, giving students the option of earning either the Office Administration or the HR Degree with two additional semesters of study.

A majority of the classes will be available online to meet students' scheduling needs and many courses are transferable if students wish to continue their education at a four-year institution.

and Degree will expand
OCC's already extensive
office-related programs,
which include Medical
Coding, Microsoft Office
Specialist and Medical
Office Assistant.

thing that was broken and seeing it work when you're done."

Marshall completed OCC's Heating, Ventilation and Air Conditioning Program in 2006 and opened MSC Mechanical two years later. The Olney-based business specializes in heating and air, refrigeration appliances and electrical work.

In addition to his HVAC training, Marshall studied architecture and design at Vincennes University.

OCC launched the new Industrial Maintenance Technology Program in August 2012 with a single certificate. Since then, the program has expanded to include three levels of certificates that can lead to an

The 8,000-square-foot Collision Repair Technology Center will include 4,400 square feet of classroom and laboratory space for the college's Collision Repair Technology program as well as expanded laboratory opportunities for the Automotive Service Technology and Welding programs.

Work is expected to begin this summer with a tentative completion date of December.

The construction project involves four contracts. Shores Builders, Inc.

of Centralia was the lowest of four bidders for the general construction work with a quote of \$711,156. B & S Plumbing and Heating, Inc. of Terre Haute was the lower of two bidders for the plumbing work at \$166,846. The electrical contract was awarded to Skill Electric, LLC of Vincennes for \$148,250. The ventilation work will be done by Heartland Mechanical Contractors, Inc. of Murphysboro, the lowest of four bidders at \$84,500.

"It is important to support new opportunities for education and job

training, which will not only benefit the students who will benefit from these expanded career options and opportunities, but the school as a whole," State Senator Righter (R-Mattoon) said.

The Olney Central College project is part of the \$31 billion Illinois Jobs Now! program, which will support more than 439,000 jobs over six years. Illinois Jobs Now! is the largest construction program in Illinois history, and is one of the largest construction programs in the nation.

Continued from Page 1 policies to reflect the intent of the revised JRCERT Standards.

"It is not unusual after a site visit to be asked to send in additional documentation to have the accreditation extended," Kocher said. "We submitted additional documentation as evidence the program is in total compliance with JRCERT Standards; we did what they asked and they extended our accreditation to eight years, which is the maximum awarded."

Kocher noted maintaining JRCERT accreditation is essential for the program and its

students.

"To sit for the American Registry of Radiologic Technologists (ARRT) primary certification exam, students have to graduate from an accredited program," Kocher said.

Most states require radiologic technologists to be ARRT credentialed.

"It says that person meets and demonstrates the required skills," Kocher said. "Having an ARRT credentialed Radiologic Technologist should put the patient's mind at ease. It demonstrates that a person knows what they are doing and can take care of you."

The Olney Central College Radiography Program will host an informational meeting for prospective students at 6 p.m. on July 31 in Wattleworth Hall Room 115.


