WVC has selected May 14, 2021 as the date for its commencement ceremony. The format for the ceremony will be decided upon and announced one month prior to the ceremony date.



Early on, the decision was made to send students home following Thanksgiving break. As can be seen, this was a

remarkably good idea, as CO-VID-19 cases increased dramatically in the county following the holiday.

## WVC Men's Basketball Claims 5 Consecutive Wins

The Warriors closed the stretch with an 86-67 win over Lewis & Clark in a Region 24 game at Spencer Sports Center. The defense has played a prominent role during the winning streak, but Carpenter is waiting for his offense to catch up.

# Warriors dodge bullet, extend GRAC winning streak to 71

The Wabash Valley College women's basketball team dodged a bullet on Saturday.

The Warriors were clinging to a 57-55 lead with just 17 seconds remaining, but it was Lake Land who had the ball and the last chance to win.

The Lakers threw the ball out of bounds with 11 seconds left. Two Warrior free throws and a last-second layup followed, and WVC had prevailed, 61-55, in a Great Rivers Athletic Conference game at Spencer Sports Center.

It was the league opener for the Warriors, who have now stretched their 71-game conference winning streak into parts of a fifth season.

"I'm proud of our effort. We showed a lot of grit defensively with such a young team. We played that whole game with all freshman, except for Jazmyn Turner."

Turner scored 27 points, leading the Warrior attack. She was also 11-of-11 at the foul line.

"Pretty impressive," Scheidecker said. "They doubled, tripled, even had four people on her at times. She just enforced her will."

"Jaz did what Jaz does," Scheidecker said.

Sophomore outside hitter Andrea Andujar Mangual went a little bit farther. She said it was more than just a win.

"It's history because it's never happened," Mangual said. "Last year we were close, but it didn't happen. "

Libero Caelyn Nelson said she was impressed with how far the team had come since defeating Frontier in the season opener just 10 days ago.

"We came together as a team tonight," said the freshman. "We got on a chemistry level we've never been to before. It's only going to get better from here."

# WVC Anglers Add Three to Their Ranks

Wabash Valley College's Bass Coach, Professor Todd Gill, has signed three more students onto the WVC bass team.

The bass team signed Calen Banks of Herod, III. and Hunter Capehart of Otwell, Ind. earlier this year for the 2021–2022 collegiate bass season.

Banks' most notable finish was a high school tourna-

ment on the Ohio River where he finished third out of 43 boats. Banks has also recorded several other top-10 finishes.

Capehart's best tournament was a second-place finish on Lake Lemon.

Gill's most recent sign on is Laindree Richardson of Benton, III.

Richardson will be joining the

Warriors for the 2022 – 2023 collegiate bass season.

In 2020, she posted two wins, three top-5 finishes, four top-20 finishes and was selected to the Bass master All-State Team for Illinois.
