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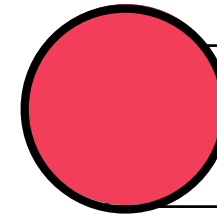

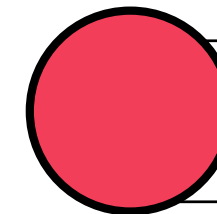

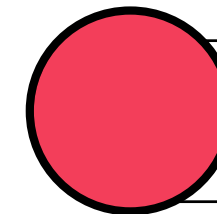
**US Army Visits Campus

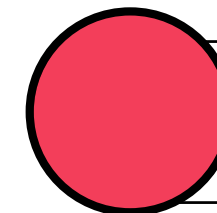
**Brubeck Arts Center

Hockgeiger/Trapp Tag-Team Social Services Dept.

Full-time instructor Rhonda Hockgeiger and adjunct instructor Danielle Trapp are the two leading psychology and social work instructors at Wabash Valley College. Both Hockgeiger and Trapp provide several different classes for students who are interested in psychology, social work, and helping others.

Hockgeiger is originally from Newton, IL. She began her career studying in the social service program at WVC; after two years of study she transferred to the University of Southern Indiana (USI). From there she obtained her Bachelor's Degree, Master's Degree, and earned a specialty in school social work. She began working as a Prevention Coordinator and soon found herself working in mental health. She became an adjunct instructor at WVC in 2014. In 2020, Hockgeiger was hired as a full-time instructor. "I've always liked working with people," Hockgeiger answered when asked how she found her calling in the psychology field. Hockgeiger also says advocacy got her into psychology. By learning how to advocate for her son who had a learning disability, Hockgeiger was inspired to help and advocate for other disabled and special needs individuals.

Trapp, an adjunct instructor for psychology and social services courses, is originally from Mt. Carmel, IL. At first, she wanted to be a teacher. When she enrolled at WVC, however, she had an instructor that was a child play therapist. She quickly developed an interest in the potential of a child play therapist career. After WVC, she obtained her Bachelor's Degree and Master's Degree in social work at USI. In 2020, Trapp began teaching at WVC as an adjunct instructor.

"I always knew I wanted to be in the realm of working with women and/or kids," Trapp expressed when asked about why she enjoys the psychology field. "[When my WVC instructor] talked about his job as a therapist, I thought 'That's it, that's what I want to do.' It just resonated with me."

Both Hockgeiger and Trapp have similar teaching strategies. When Hockgeiger teaches, her goal is engagement. Her classes aim to engage students and incorporate them within different subjects. Hockgeiger brings in modern outside elements to reinforce what her classes are studying. Overall, she pushes for her students to engage, learn, and understand the material. Trapp enjoys having her students engage and share their experiences and opinions in her classes in a seminar styled environment. She aims to understand and learn from her students. Similar to Hockgeiger, Trapp also brings in current elements that will emphasize her lessons.

"I love sharing my experiences with people and hearing their experiences," Trapp said, "and connecting with the students. I like learning about the students and helping them grow."

Both instructors expect engagement, mutual respect, a desire to learn, participation, and smiling faces in their classes. They want to help their students grow and work with them through their learning experiences.

“I like working with young people, non-traditional students—I like helping them get an education,” Hockgeiger stated, “and I like helping them see what the future is going to look like and see them change the world.”

Hockgeiger spends a lot of her time with her children and grandchildren. She and her husband always try to sneak off to the beach whenever they find the time. Trapp, a mother of three boys, loves spending time with her family. Trapp is a fan of the band *Hanson* and Disney. She is a big fan of *The Little Mermaid*, *Beauty and the Beast*, *Cinderella*, and more Disney movies. Equally, both Hockgeiger and Trapp love thrifting and “Milk and Honey,” a local Mt. Carmel café.

Hockgeiger and Trapp are willing to help anyone who is considering following a career path in psychology, social work, or a career that involves helping people. Their dedication to helping those in need is inspiring and worth a special mention.

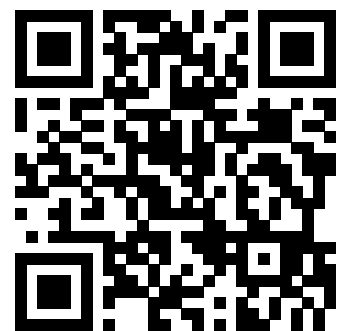
