GUITARIST BEN GATENO TO PERFORM FEBRUARY 16

A native of southern Minnesota, guitarist Ben Gateno earned Master's and Doctoral degrees in performance from the Eastman School of Music in Rochester, NY. Following graduate school, Ben studied for one year with renowned teacher and performer Antigoni Goni in Brussels, Belgium. After his return to the US, Ben spent five years performing extensively as a member of the Minneapolis Guitar Quartet.

A versatile musician, Ben enjoys presenting solo guitar programs that feature a wide range of styles and genres, with a special emphasis on classical, country blues, and ragtime. In 2020 he released A Time When Things Were New, an album featuring solo guitar music from the 1920s. In 2021 Ben joined the roster of esteemed educators and performers at Stefan Grossman's Guitar Workshop. For SGGW, Ben has produced two books of acoustic blues and ragtime transcriptions and Stomping Along the Fretboard - a series of three extended video lessons.

Since 2021 Ben has also been the electric guitarist for the Crop Circles, the backing band for singersongwriter Luke Hendrickson.

Ben resides in Rochester, MN where he maintains a busy private teaching schedule.

LTC REACHES MORE THAN 1M ON SOCIAL MEDIA



Lincoln Trail College had more than one million people see its content on Facebook, Instagram, TikTok, and Twitter in 2022. "We had a social media reach of 1.3 million users last year," said Illinois Eastern Community College Director of Marketing and Public Information Chris Forde, who oversees Lincoln Trail's social accounts. "That was a 37 percent increase over the previous year." Reach is defined as the total number of people who have seen content.

LTC's social channels had two million impressions last year. An impression is recorded each time a piece of content is seen on a screen. For example, if 100 people saw a piece of content three times each,

the impressions would be recorded as 300.

"While I'm proud of our impressions and reach, the number I'm really proud of is our engagement rate," said Forde. "Lincoln Trail College had an engagement rate of 3.79%. Most social media marketing experts agree that a good engagement rate is between 1% and 5%." LTC outperformed the median engagement rate for colleges and universities, which is 3.37%. Engagement is measured as people interacting with social content through things like likes, shares, and comments.



Lincoln Trail College launched a new initiative with TikTok in 2022. Most of the content for TikTok came from students enrolled in the Student Publications class. "Breaking into a new channel is difficult, especially one that is short-form video-driven and has heavy content expectations. If your video wasn't high-quality, thought-provoking, or even controversial, viewers will be less likely to engage with it, and therefore you'll earn a smaller engagement rate per view. If your video grabbed attention, viewers will be more likely to take the extra step of engagement before swiping to the next video," said Forde.

Of the four platforms that measure engagement, TikTok had LTC's highest engagement rate of 5.54%. "While the engagement was high, viewers don't say long. On average, people only watched LTC's videos for 9.67 seconds. That really demonstrates the ephemeralness of attention on the platform,' said Forde.

On YouTube, viewers logged over 1,500 hours of watch time on LTC's channel. That number was up 44 percent from 2021. Total views increased 54% to 82,900 for the year. LTC had over 473,000 impressions on YouTube. The statistics on YouTube are not aggregated into LTC's overall reach, impressions, or engagement on social media platforms.

STUDENT ATHLETES COMBINE FOR 3.26 GPA

One of the most consistent successes at Lincoln Trail College is the performance of student-athletes in the classroom. In the Fall 2022 Semester, LTC's student-athletes combined for a GPA of 3.26.

"I'm super excited about this," said Athletic Director and Baseball Coach Kevin Bowers. "This is one of the highest GPA's we've achieved as a department."

LTC has marked 18 consecutive semesters where the combined GPA for the Athletic Department has been at least a 3.0.

Seven of LTC's teams had a 3.0 or higher led by the baseball team's 3.46 team GPA. The softball team was close behind with a 3.41 GPA followed by the women's soccer team with a 3.37 GPA. The volleyball team had a 3.18 GPA, the men's soccer team had a 3.14 GPA, the women's basketball team had a 3.11 GPA and the men's basketball team finished the semester with a 3.1 GPA. The golf team rounded out the Athletic Department with a 2.8 GPA.

"This is a total team effort," said Bowers. "This only happens when all are pulling that rope in the same direction. We have an excellent faculty and staff that want to see not only our student-athletes success, but all of our students. We're fortunate to have so many caring and compassionate people that provide our students with the guidance and one-on-one attention they need in order to be successful. It really shows how truly invested our faculty and staff are in the lives of our students."
