FCC Offers Tuition-Free Summer Classes

Frontier Community College is giving students a chance to continue their education while saving a significant amount of money by offering tuition-free summer classes. There will be a total of five classes offered this summer, both in-person and online. "By offering these courses, we are hoping to make things a little bit easier for all students whether they're close to earning a degree or not. Students who are already enrolled at FCC will benefit from these classes being offered, but we also want to



make it known that juniors and seniors in high school, or anyone who has an interest in a subject or making progress towards a degree, is able to enroll as well," said Dean of Instruction Paul Bruinsma.

Elementary Spanish II (SPN 1121) is an online class that will help satisfy part of your foreign language requirement or serve as an elective. It's also a good course for education majors to take.

Composition and Analysis (ENG 1121) meets Wednesdays 12:00-1:50pm. It can help satisfy an English requirement for graduation.

Introduction to Business (BUS 1101) is an online class that should be taken by students interested in business, marketing, or management. It also serves as a transfer elective.

Philosophy of Religion (PHI 2121) meets Mondays from 12:30-3:10pm. The course satisfies part of the humanities requirement for graduation.

Medical Terminology (HEA 1225) meets Tuesdays from 12:30-3:10pm. This class is required for many healthcare-related programs and also serves as a transfer elective.

"The tuition free classes are removing a financial barrier to those students who otherwise may not be able to take summer courses. Also, this allows prospective or current students to take classes that will help them be closer to completing their Associate degree," said College Admission Representative Carrie Halbert.

These classes are being offered tuition free. Students enrolling are still responsible for fees, books, and materials.

• The Business and Industry (B&I) division hosted a one-day workshop on Tools for Economic Development at the West Richland Center. The workshop covered important community growth topics such as TIF, Opportunity & Enterprise zones, Business Districts, Main street and Tourism, and Strategic Planning. Over 40 individuals from area communities attended the workshop. The event was well received and the feedback was excellent. Mike Stanford, City Administrator from Flora, had this to say about the event:

"The seminar more than exceeded my expectations. It was great to hear from other communities and how they are using the different economic tools to grow business and housing in their area. Also, to hear about possible issues you may run into and ways to work with other taxing bodies to make the program benefit everyone. I am already looking forward to the next workshop to gain more ideas that could help out the City of Flora."
