TELECOM MOVES FORWARD AFTER TORNADO

n March 31st, a tornado wreaked havoc on Lincoln Trail College's Crisp Center, the home of the Broadband Telecom program. Despite the destruction, the college is pleased to announce that the semester will continue as scheduled.

To ensure the program's seamless operation, the students have been temporarily relocated to the College's Professional Annex Building on North Campus. Cynthia Boyce, Dean of Instruction at LTC, stated that the College is actively procuring necessary supplies for the students. Additionally, a pole yard is being established to enable students to receive hands-on experience in setting poles and hanging line. Corporate partners of the program have come forward to donate supplies to aid the students for the remainder of the semester.

In the meantime, the College is also working to begin internships for students earlier than usual. Normally, these internships take place during the summer; however, LTC is hoping to start them as soon as next week so that students can gain valuable hands-

on experience. Several companies have already agreed to take students early.

LTC's Broadband Telecom program is the only one of its kind in Illinois. It provides students with training for careers in the telecommunications industry and covers a wide range of topics, including copper and fiber optic cabling, home and business phone systems, computer hardware and software, networking, and central office switching.

The Crisp Center, which housed the program, was not only a classroom, but it also had several unique labs where students could have hands-on training. It also had an outdoor lab where students could learn how to perform tasks such as climbing poles, outside plant operations and maintenance, and operating equipment.

The College would like to express its gratitude to everyone who has offered their support and assistance during this difficult time.

STEPENS NAMED ADULT LEARNER OF THE YEAR

The Illinois Adult and Continuing Educators Association recognized a Lincoln Trail College student at its 2023 Conference and Awards Luncheon in Springfield. Kathryn Stephens won the Paul Simon Adult Learner of the Year Award.

The Paul Simon Adult Learner of the Year award aims to honor exceptional Adult Education students who have exhibited outstanding leadership in both traditional





and nontraditional learning settings. The award recognizes learners who have made positive changes in their lives and those around them through their learning experiences, despite difficult circumstances. It also acknowledges learners who have maintained their family, civic, or employment responsibilities while pursuing their educational goals and have supported other learners in their journey. The award also recognizes individuals who have received accolades and recognition for their educational achievements from educational institutions, communities, or civic groups.

Stephens earned her High School Equivalency Certificate in September of 2022 at Lincoln Trail College and is now enrolled as a fulltime student. She managed to complete the GED program in about four weeks.

Stephens says that when her daughter went to preschool, she used it as motivation to go back to school and earn her GED. "This is so much more than just a piece of paper to me. This is my whole life. All the doors have opened because of this piece of paper. It's gave me all my self-worth and everything. My confidence is through the roof now because I know that I can do it and my potential is endless."

Stephens intends on going into the counseling profession after earning her college degree.

PROGRESS MADE ON CCRC STEEL STRUCTURE AND EXTERIOR WALL PANELS



Work on the Crawford County Recreation Center continues to move forward. The construction of the building's steel structure and installation of vertical exterior metal panels are nearing completion.

With most of the exterior vertical metal panels installed, contractors have shifted their focus to interior work throughout the building. Wall framing is nearly complete, and electrical and plumbing rough-ins within the framed walls are progressing quickly. CMU wall construction

in the shower area is almost finished, and roof panel installation is approaching completion.

In addition, the painting of the structural steel in the gymnasium portion has recently begun. A new electrical service to the building was trenched across the LTC yard and is being prepared for Ameren's work and completion. Underground water and sanitary sewer work was recently completed, and the drive south of the new building received new asphalt paving to repair the area disturbed by the underground utility work.



The installation of horizontal exterior metal wall panels has begun on

the southwest corner of the new building. Terra cotta-colored panels, matching the recent Performing Arts addition panels, will soon be installed on the west face of the building.

In the coming weeks, many trades will continue to work on the interior and exterior activities currently in progress, as well as begin and move forward with other activities such as hanging drywall, continuing to pull wire for the electrical service throughout the building, installation of plumbing piping, and HVAC duct work installation.

ILLINOIS EASTERN COMMUNITY COLLEGES JOINS #CCMONTH CAMPAIGN



Illinois Eastern Community Colleges announced that it will join #CCMonth, a monthlong grassroots education and stigma-busting campaign coordinated by the Association of Community College Trustees (ACCT). The primary goals of #CCmonth are to improve awareness of the economic, academic and equity advantages of attending community colleges, and to bust longtime stigmas wrongly associated with public two-year colleges.

"The past year has proved beyond any doubt that our college is absolutely vital to our community and our state," Dr. Ryan Gower, Chancellor, Illinois Eastern Community Colleges said. "#CCMonth is an opportunity to reach out into both and to demonstrate not only that community colleges should be the first choice of many collegegoers, but why community colleges are first-class institutions that are vital to our local and state economies."

Public community colleges are a uniquely American educational model that was designed to guarantee access to affordable, high-quality higher education for all people. They are the primary educators of life-saving nursing and other healthcare professionals among many others. They also serve as an onramp to bachelor's, master's and higher-level degrees for many students, and particularly for the most demographically and socioeconomically diverse students. They guarantee fair admissions for all students. They offer supports for adult students who have to work to support their families. And without community colleges, many American students would not be able to access higher education at all.

In short, community colleges were created to serve the needs of their communities, and they do it exceptionally well.

Despite all this, many American people wrongly believe that community colleges are inferior institutions, and in most states, universities receive significantly more per-student state support than community colleges do. These negative attitudes and disparities support and encourage ongoing socioeconomic and demographic disadvantages and inequities in the United States.

"Community colleges are engines of diversity, equity and inclusion," said ACCT President and CEO Jee Hang Lee. "They give opportunities to all students, and they support all students throughout their educations, whether they attend to attain an associate degree or certificate, intend to transfer on for a bachelor's or higher degree, or they take one or a few courses to learn a new skill or expand their horizons."

MILLA NAMED HEAD SOCCER COACH

Javier Milla has been named Lincoln Trail College's new soccer coach. Milla, who served as an assistant coach for LTC in the Fall 2022 season, will oversee both the men's and women's programs.

"I am very excited for the opportunity," said Milla. "It means a lot. To be completely honest it was something I never imagined a year ago when I arrived to LTC. It is a big step for my young career as a coach."

Milla played soccer at the University of Illinois Springfield and served as a graduate assistant coach at Tusculum University before joining LTC.

Milla says he wants to keep building the culture that previous coach Alex Morais started. "I've known Alex for a few years already, and we see the sport in a very similar way. We want to keep being disciplined and enjoy the sport we love."

He believes both programs are in a phase of growth, but he also believes that next season they can compete to win the region, district and reach the national tournament. "Last season was a record-breaking one for both programs, but our expectations are to keep breaking records. Most of our players from last season, both with men and women, are returning for their sophomore year. This, plus the freshman that will be joining in August, will create a very competitive team. Both the men and women will have an ever-stronger squad. Now, my job is to put all the pieces together and create a team that will go compete and win."

He says the teams are focusing on their spring seasons and that they're using the spring to learn how he likes his teams to play. "The goal is to start getting the idea now in Spring, so in Fall of our returners will now what to expect. Everyone knows their job and what it is expected from them on the field."
