My Own Game! Coding Grades 5-12


This computer gaming summer camp is the perfect place for all budding game developers and coders to learn the ins and outs of creating their own video games.

"They can do the entire general chemistry sequence or organic chemistry sequence in just 10 weeks. Both sequences are extremely demanding. With these summer courses, students will have the benefit of taking them in smaller classes over a focused period of time."


The courses are broken into two, 5-week sessions, offered May 16 through June 16, and June 20 through July 21.

CHM 2120 Organic Chemistry I and CHM 2122 Organic Chemistry II will meet from 8 to 11:30 a.m. CHM 1130 General Chemistry I and CHM 1132 General Chemistry II will meet from 12 to 3:30 p.m. All classes will be held Monday through Friday.

Organic Chemistry is required for pre-professional

careers including pre-med, pre-dentistry, pre-pharmacy and pre-veterinary medicine, biological science and chemistry majors, and students preparing to enter the chiropractic field. General Chemistry is recommended for any of the STEM majors.

Graduation is a time of reflection, but also a time of looking ahead. Commencement means the beginning. On May 12, OCC graduates will begin their journey to another challenge. Whether it be to a four-year school or a job, they begin a journey that will include peaks and valleys. high schools. The goal is to expand the offerings during the fall semester in order to provide additional dual credit opportunities to area high school students. By doing so, we will enhance the chances that these students will have an early start to college and attend an IECC school in order to complete their degree or certificate over three years. We refer to this as "Three To Your Degree" (3TYD).

The new Illinois K-12 State Superintendent of Instruction, Dr. Tony Sanders, visited OCC on April 28. Around forty area educational leaders, including principals and superintendents attended the event. Several IECC staff also attended. Dr. Sanders provided these individuals with his vision for K-12 education in Illinois. That vision includes a very strong connection with community college partners in order to provide high school students with focused pathways.

The Hoffmann Prairie, an area around the pond at the south end of campus, was a project that was initiated in 1987 through a generous bequest by Jim Higgins, an attorney from Wilmette, Illinois in honor of his uncle, James F. Hoffmann. As one of four brothers involved in the floral industry, he enjoyed a lifelong association with floriculture in the north shore area of Chicago. Mr. Hoffmann and his wife, Nettie, retired to Lazy Acres, located at the eastern edge of Olney in the 1960s. The Hoffmann Prairie project was meant to be a testament to Mr. Hoffmann's career.

For many years, the Hoffmann Prairie provided students at OCC with an outstanding outdoor horticulture and floriculture lab. In recent years, the Prairie was not really used much and needed restoration. Recently, OCC Welding Instructor, Maverick Fisher, along with OCC Science Instructor, Sarah Bergbower, took an interest in restoration of the outdoor lab and returning it to previous glory. I am pleased to announce that due to these efforts, a restoration project will start this spring with the support of the County Line Quail Forever club. Thanks to Maverick and Sarah for their vision and work to make this happen.
