On Friday, October 27th, local home-school students in addition to students from Full Armor Christian Academy, Mission III Academy, and The Nuc visited campus to learn more about the Automotive Technology and Electrical Distribution Systems (EDS) programs. Automotive Instructor Rodney Maxey taught the group about positive and negative charges and had them perform some hands-on work. They also got a tour of the automotive lab and were able to race one another to see who could change a tire the quickest. Following that portion of the morning, EDS Instructor Dustin Wiggins shared what the EDS program encompasses and had the students volunteer for demonstrations. Wiggins showed them how to operate the bucket truck, how to have all the necessary gear and safety equipment before climbing, and answered any questions they had. The group had a lot of fun taking in the information and many of whom shared potential interest in one day entering one of the programs. College Admission Representative Carrie Halbert, who organized the event, spoke about why visits such as this are important. "Having these students on campus and letting them get exposed to our programs, seeing how hands-on some of them are is always a fun way for them to learn more about FCC. They enjoy it, we enjoy it, and we just hope one day they come back to a Bobcat," said Halbert.

Transitions Academy Cohort Session Takes Place

On Thursday, October 26th, Adult Education Program Director Rodney Ranes attending the Cohort Convos Application: A 2023 Transitions Academy Event. The Transitions Academy is designed to assist programs and their partnerships in developing, strengthening, and updating Bridge and Integrated Career and Academic Preparation System (ICAPS) programs by increasing awareness between Adult Education and Technical Education as it relates to the ICAPS models, Illinois Bridge programs, and Illinois programs of study, according to the ICAPS web page. The Academy itself convenes each fall and persists throughout the year by way of virtual learning communities, mentoring, professional learning opportunities, and communication.

IECC currently has an ICAPS in Welding. Based on discussions, there are plans to pursue additional ICAPS in CNA, Phlebotomy, and potentially an Agriculture area. An additional ICAPS 2 program in an Information Technology certificate are is also being researched.

Ranes spoke about what he took away from the event. "It was an informative day and the ICCB staff and the state professional development networks did an excellent job of explaining how to better serve students through the ICAPS programs. It was also good to hear the challenges that many other colleges are facing in implementing these programs so we had some insight into what solutions they have in place moving forward," said Ranes.

TimelyCare Receives Recognition

Virtual care provider, TimelyCare, has been recognized as the 'Gold winner' in the Merit Awards for Healthcare and named the "Best Mental Health Tech Solution" for the second consecutive year.

In February, IECC partnered with TimelyCare to provide mental health services on all IECC campuses through at least 2026. TimelyCare offers students access to on-demand assistance from scheduling appointments, to peer-guided community resources they can use anytime, anywhere.

IECC continues to expand the ways in which support is offered for students as they navigate through their college experience.

Chief Academic Officer Paul Bruinsma spoke about the importance of offering such a resource for students.

"College can be a stressful time for students. Having a resource like TimelyCare at the tip of their finger to provide counseling, health coaching, community resources, etc., is invaluable. Knowing that students have access to the help they may need at any time is comforting and I look forward to exploring future ways we can continue to address student needs," said Bruinsma.

EDS Scholarship Recipients

Business & Industry Update

Mining & Industrial Training (MIT): Workforce Education Instructor Wendy Coles has received her OSHA instructor certification for construction. The first OSHA construction classes were held at the Terry L. Bruce West Richland Center on November 1st and 2nd.

The final items are being removed from the John A. Logan campus to be transferred or disposed of. The process should be complete by the end of November.

MIT is participating in the CTE Spotlight Day at Southeastern Illinois College on Thursday, November 16th for local high school students.

EP: Program Director of Emergency Preparedness Brent Maguire completed the ALICE Active Shooter training. He presented breakout sessions at the recent district workshop and will be providing scenario-based training throughout the district beginning in November.

EP recently attended a college and career fair at Lawrenceville High School and Fairfield Community High School. EP also participated in the Healthcare Expo in Robinson on November 8th.

SBDC: On Thursday, October 5th the Small Business Development Center hosted a business financing workshop in partnership with Illinois Finance Authority. SBDC also presented a workshop on how to start a small business in the Robinson at the Chamber office. The November workshop on starting a small business will take place in Salem.

SBDC has been actively networking with local chambers and attended monthly chamber meetings at Robinson, Olney, and Lawrenceville where SBDC services were presented.

A 'Social Media for Small Businesses' workshop will be held at the Lawrence County Chamber Office on Wednesday, November 15th.

General Workforce Training: Business and Industry (B&I) provided forklift training for the City of Fairfield in October. The city is a new client, and will be receiving several OSHA topic trainings through the remainder of the fiscal year.

Within the last month, B&I met with several local employers to continue talks about training. Some of the employers included Baldwin, BraunAbility, Crawford Memorial Hospital, Wayne-White Counties Electrical Co-op, and Dana. Motorad has committed to additional leadership training as well as CDL training for the new semi and OSHA training necessary for team leads. These are scheduled to begin in December.

Title III Update

Cell Bowl: It is Cell Bowl time again! Every year, the American Society for Clinical Pathology hosts the National Cell Bowl, a competition between college Medical Laboratory Technician (MLT) and Medical Laboratory Scientist (MLS) programs from across the nation in a challenge of their knowledge of blood cell morphology. The students have one minute to correctly identify up to 30 different cells. Among the students receiving a perfect score identifying all 30 cells, ranking is determined by the elapsed time.

As of the official standings for the fourth week of competition, FCC's MLT Bobcat Team is currently ranked 13th in the west bracket with a perfect score and best time of 47.4445 seconds. Among in-state institutions, FCC tops all other Illinois MLT programs, only trailing Loyola University and University of Illinois-Springfield, which are both four-year MLS programs.

MLT Instructors Julie Dehart and Cindy Green note the consistent improvements of the team since the beginning of the season from last year's scores. Dehart spoke on the success of the team thus far. "As a team, we have had perfect scores for the last three weeks. This week's score is 39 seconds which is phenomenal. The top score in the nation is approximately 23 seconds. Last year no one accomplished a perfect score," said Dehart.

Quality Matters: This month two additional IECC staff members completed the Quality Matters (QM) rubric course. Director for IECC's Center for Excellence in Teaching and Learning Michael Conn and Distance Learning Specialist Amanda Kotch both completed the rigorous course.

The QM course is an introduction to the eight general standards and 44 specific review standards used to evaluate the design of online and hybrid courses. Conn and Kotch are each now registered to begin the second level of training, peer review, to begin in November. This brings the number of faculty and staff who have completed the course through the Title III Grant to ten. The dividends for this investment are clear from the continual increase in the quality of Frontier's hybrid and online courses.
