Various speakers gave their respective updates including English Instructor Kim Wellen and Title III Project Director Morris Nead, among others.

The campus as a whole gathered for the second portion of the workshop in the late morning. President Jay Edgren gave the welcome and highlighted the employees that have been hired between the last gathering and now. Edgren also gave updates on current and future FCC additions/ renovations including details on the Athletic Facility.

Athletic Director Nixie Hnetkovsky gave a brief update on all things athletics including the plans to speed up and finish out the Queen of Hearts drawings.

An Adult Education update was provided by Program Director Rodney Ranes. He highlighted some of the accomplishments over the end of 2023 and a lookahead to 2024.

2023 Business and Industry (B&I) highlights:

An official ribbon cutting ceremony took place after Room 104 at the Terry L. Bruce West Richland Center underwent renovations to become the Small Business Development Center (SBDC) office.

A monthly 'How to Start a Small Business in Illinois' workshop was held.

A finance workshop was hosted in partnership with the Illinois Finance Authority.

A hospitality round-table took place in partnership with Local Workforce Innovation Area 23, 26, and The Illinois Department of Employment Security.

B&I actively networked with local chambers and the SBDC was a frequent presenter at 'lunch and learns'.

Upcoming events in the spring include a workshop on financial reports as well as a CEO Summit.

A variety of new training topics were offered in Fall of 2023 including Microsoft Power BI, OSHA 300, OSHA Construction, Beginning Excel, Active Listening, and more.

Multiple new employer partnerships were formed in 2023, with a goal of increasing that number even higher in 2024. B&I continues to provide training to local businesses and strives to make any additions possible to what they offer to meet the needs of the surrounding communities.

Title III Update

2023 was a momentous year for FCC's Title III Program. Grant supported projects continued to grow and see success throughout the year. 2024 is already promising to be a banner year for the program.

Highlighting the year was the announcement that the National Accrediting Agency for Clinical Laboratory Sciences had granted FCC's Medical Laboratory Technician (MLT) program accreditation for five years, the maximum term of initial accreditation allowed. The MLT program continues to grow in every metric measured. 2023 saw the largest freshman class yet (ten students) and applications for admission along with inquiries to entering the class for Fall 2024 indicate that record may soon be shattered. FCC graduated its second class of MLT graduates with 100% employment immediately upon graduation. Strong relationships with area hospitals flourished in 2023, as donations of key instructional equipment and supplies came in along with the recruiting of students for post-graduate employment. Already in 2024, there has been a recruiting request made from a potential employer outside of our region.

Three new Certified Peer Reviewers, ready, willing, and able to assist faculty in building high-quality online and hybrid courses were added to the roster in 2023. In the first week of January '24, two additional staff members have registered for the Quality Matters (QM) Rubric Course, the first step in the QM training programs. With the assistance of such well-qualified course designers, the fourth semester MLT courses as well as several additional Math, Science, and Certified Medical Assistant courses are ready to be rolled out in high-quality hybrid format in 2024.

The Title III Team is looking forward to key benchmarks yet to come in 2024, including a roll out of the new Degree Works and CRM Advise programs. Excitement is building over the positive impacts these programs will have in the success of our students. Additionally, the team is exploring the feasibility of expanding the faculty recording studio to include additional equipment for production and editing as well as a sound booth. The studio's outreach has grown exponentially during 2023, and the Title III Program looks forward to providing expanded high-quality service to FCC faculty in the year ahead.
