David Spitz to hold book signing in Learning Commons

Olney native David Spitz will hold a book signing for his novel, *Lincoln's Agent: On the Trail of a Killer*, from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. on March 15 in the OCC Learning Commons. Copies of the book will be available for purchase at \$15 each.

Set amid the rising tensions of mid-18th century America, Spitz's work of historical fiction follows the struggles of U.S. Marshal Arnett McCann who is called to Washington, D.C. as the nation teeters on the verge of civil war.

Area readers will find familiar locations and names, as portions of this action-packed thriller take place amid the rolling hills and bluffs of Southern Illinois. Throughout the novel, McCann tries to keep his life together as the world around him spins out of control and he sidesteps the U.S. Civil War.

Spitz says of the novel. "It is complex with three or four issues going on at one time and more than one thing that leads to the book's conclusion."

Spitz began his writing career publishing song lyrics in 2016. He then chose to pursue a bachelor's degree in creative writing. A university, where he applied, required a writing sample and Spitz's submission became the basis for Lincoln's Agent.

Students and graduates participate in National TRIO Day

One hundred and five lowincome and first-generation TRIO students and graduates participated in the 2024 National TRIO Day on Feb. 24.

Students who attended were inspired to continue their personal growth journey by learning about leadership, communication, social emotional learning and solf management and resilie

and self-management, and resiliency.

Paradigmshift is an amazing organization who shapes future leaders. They deliver innovative leadership training and resources to students and professionals. Three Paradigmshift professionals attended the workshop and lead interactive sessions with TRIO students.

The day started with icebreakers, team building, and an overview of the day. Students from all over were able to meet one another, participate in fun icebreaker activities, and get ready for an exciting day of learning. The students were split into three groups and headed to each breakout session.

The first breakout session topic was leadership communication. In this session, students were able to learn how they communicate and how to better communicate with others. The second breakout session focused on self-management. In this session, students discussed how to think about what they are going to say before speaking, how their words may affect others, and how to have self-control.

The last breakout session topic was resiliency. This session helped the students understand how to be resilient. The students were given a task with little information about how to complete it. Working together as a group and not giving up on the task at hand, they were able to recover quickly from difficulties and succeed at completing the task given to them.

Seven federally funded programs called TRIO are making a world of difference for millions of students from low-income families who strive to be the first in their families to attend and graduate from college. For more than 50 years, TRIO programs have been providing students, from low-income and working families, with valuable supportive services, which enable them to successfully enter college and graduate.

TRIO services include tutoring, personal and financial counseling, career counseling, assistance with the college admissions process, college visits, instruction in composition, literature, STEM, personal development, study skills, lab science, foreign language, and mathematics, test prep, work study program, SEL, financial literacy and assistance with FAFSA and scholarships, in addition to academic support and advising in high school through college graduation.

Today more than 1,000 colleges, universities, and community agencies host more than 2,800 TRIO projects that serve more than 800,000 young people and adults. TRIO serves students of all racial and ethnic backgrounds. Currently, 34 percent of TRIO students are White, 33 percent are African-American, 21 percent are Hispanic, 4 percent are Asian-American or Pacific Islander, 4 percent are American Indian, and 1 percent are listed as "other," including multiracial students.

"We are so glad that we were given the opportunity to host such an amazing event where so many motivated, inspiring, and remarkable students came to spend their Saturday learning and growing together," said Annie McGrail, Assistant Director of IECC TRIO Upward Bound. "TRIO is lucky to have such determined young people who dedicate their time to becoming the best version of themselves. In honor of National TRIO Day, we proudly walk beside these students as they grow together with other students who are also working on their own personal growth journey."

TRIO – Upward Bound programs are 100% federally funded by the Department of Education for (LTC) \$324,979, (OCC) \$376,462, and (WVC) \$309,505.

TRIO – SSS is 100% federally-funded for \$361,922 as a college–based educational opportunity outreach program that motivates and supports students from low-income backgrounds – including military veterans and students with disabilities.
