More than 400 area students attended Olney Central College's Blue Preview on September 25.

Students from Clay City, Edwards County, Newton Community, Full Armor and Richland County high schools attended, alongside eighth graders from Clay City, Richland County and St. Joseph. This year marked the first time middle school students were invited to participate as local school districts are set to incorporate career exploration into their middle school curriculums.

John James Audubon presentation


Olney Central College welcomed the Ridgway Chapter of the Illinois Audubon Society and their guest speaker, Brian "Fox" Ellis on September 26.

Science Club paints with bacteria

The OCC Science Club created microbial art by "painting" with bacteria on nutrient agar plates.

Using an inoculating loop, they spread bacterial colonies — consisting of trillions of cells — across the plates. Although invisible to the naked eye at first, the pigmented organisms reproduce and reveal vibrant images as they grow.

Students used three species for their artwork: Micrococcus luteus (yellow), Serratia marcescens (red) and Bacillus megaterium (beige).

SICA Concert Series hosts MusiKaravan Oct. 25

MusiKaravan is set to bring an eclectic musical performance to the Dr. John D. Stull Performing Arts Center at 7 p.m. on October 25 as part of the Southeastern Illinois Concert Association's 2024-2025 concert series.

When COVID-19 hit and concert venues closed their doors, the violinists Etienne Gara and YuEun Kim of the LA-based chamber orchestra Delirium Musicum took to the road in Boris, their 1971 VW bus, for what became a six-month odyssey, performing for farmworkers, winemakers, random passersby and various animals.

As MusiKaravan, their goal was to celebrate, and thank, the people who were "working hard to feed us physically and emotionally."

Now, with the addition of a cellist, MusiKaravan is bringing its eclectic programming to concert stages nationwide and beyond. The artists share tales of their adventures on the road, including playing for an audience of ostriches.

A MusiKaravan concert can be imagined as a fun, impromptu musical picnic, perfect for all ages and backgrounds.

The players:

Etienne Gara, French-Hungarian violinist and Artistic Director of Delirium Musicum, has recorded a solo album on a Stradivarius from 1714, performs internationally and regularly joins the Los Angeles Philharmonic at Walt Disney Concert Hall and the Hollywood Bowl. He was featured on Leonard Cohen's last album.

YuEun Kim, violinist, is an international competition winner and in-demand soloist and chamber musician, who performs around the world and has a YouTube channel boasting over 6,000,000 views.

Stella Cho, cellist, was raised in the UK, made her solo début at London's Royal Albert Hall at the age of 15, and concertizes on three continents. Her superpower is being a human GPS – she can point you to any restaurant at anytime, anywhere.

Concert tickets may be purchased at the door. The cost is \$25 for adults and \$5 for children.

OCC Music Department to host Fall Concerts Oct. 9 & Nov. 6

Olney Central College's Music Department will present two upcoming concerts, starting with the OCC Jazz and Commercial Music Ensembles at 7 p.m. on October 9 in the Dr. John D. Stull Performing Arts Center.

The OCC Jazz Ensemble, led by Director of Bands Wade Baker, will perform a variety of contemporary pieces, including *Kite* and *Young Stuff* by the American jazz fusion band Snarky Puppy, as well as *The Crossing* by the Menahan Street Band.

"This semester we focused more on contemporary jazz instead of things in the past," Baker said. "We're keeping it fresh."

In addition to the Jazz Ensemble, Baker will direct the Commercial Music Ensemble, which features returning students with more live performance experience. These musicians composed and arranged their own tunes.

"This is an opportunity for the community to get to come out and enjoy the individual expression of our students," Baker said. "The goal is to record these songs in our new studio."

The first-semester Commercial Music Ensemble will take the stage, performing popular hits like Ain't No Rest for the Wicked by Cage the Elephant, Johnny B. Goode by Chuck Berry and Moving Out by Billy Joel.

This group is under the direction of Adjunct Instructor Josh Moats, an OCC graduate. James Whitfield, a fellow alum with a degree in audio production from Eastern Illinois University, will manage the sound for the bands.

"It says a lot about the success of our program that students want to come back and help write the legacy of the department," Baker added.

On November 6, the community is invited to enjoy performances by the OCC Concert and Big Bands, along with various chamber ensembles, including a brass ensemble, clarinet trio, saxophone trio and flute quartet. Concert Band selections are Flourish for Wind Band, Yorkshire Ballad and An English Sea Song Suite, while the Big Band will surprise audiences with a mix of fun and familiar tunes.

Baker said the program continues to grow, especially with the addition of its premier recording studio.

"I want to thank all the people who have donated funds toward the recording studio, creating a nontraditional environment for our students to thrive in."

Concert admission is free. Donations will be accepted at the door.
