INTELLIGENT.COM RANKS LINCOLN TRAIL COLLEGE AMONG BEST IN U.S.

ntelligent.com, a widely recognized source for higher education rankings and research, has included Lincoln Trail College in its annual assessment, awarding it The Best Community Colleges for 2025. In their rankings of the Top 50 Community Colleges in the United States, LTC was ranked 40th.

"Being ranked by Intelligent.com as one of the top Community Colleges in the United States is extremely exciting, a significant accomplishment, and it is evidence that Lincoln Trail College is comprised of a group of highly qualified faculty and staff who are all committed to fulfilling the IECC mission which is to deliver exceptional education and services to improve the lives of our students and to strengthen our communities," said LTC President Tona Ambrose.

Unlike conventional rankings, Intelligent.com employs a rigorous, data-driven methodology designed to provide students with the most accurate and meaningful evaluations. Each community college is assessed on a proprietary scale of



0 to 100, with scores derived from four key factors: academic quality, graduation rates, cost and return on investment (ROI), and student resources. This distinctive approach ensures that institutions with strong academic rigor, affordable programs, and exceptional student support rank higher, helping prospective students make the most informed decisions.

The evaluation process is enhanced by leveraging comprehensive data from trusted sources such as U.S. News & World Report, the U.S. Department of Education's College Scorecard, and the Bureau of Labor Statistics. These sources are cross-checked with

internal reviews and aggregated rankings to ensure the most accurate and up-to-date results.

Lincoln Trail College received an Intelligent Score of 76.06 and was one of only two downstate Illinois colleges to make the list. Olney Central College was ranked 50th.

"This ranking demonstrates that LTC is not only meeting our academic goals but also exceeding the expectations and needs of our students," said Ambrose. "The recognition speaks to the dedication of our faculty and staff, whose commitment to high standards and student success is obvious and it reflects that LTC offers a rigorous and supportive academic environment where all students can thrive. LTC UNVEILS NEW ATHLETIC PERFORMANCE CENTER, THE BARN

Located on the LTC campus, The Barn features a comprehensive weight room, modern cardiovascular equipment, and an indoor training facility for baseball and softball that can also be adapted for indoor soccer practice. This multifunctional approach ensures that studentathletes from various sports can benefit from top-notch training environments year-round.



The Athletic Performance Center has been nicknamed The Barn because it reflects the commitment of Lincoln Trail College to create a place where hard work, dedication, and community come together. Just as a traditional barn has long been a symbol of growth, resilience, and teamwork in rural communities, The Barn represents a space where LTC's student-athletes can build their strength, refine their skills, and grow as individuals. The name honors the college's roots in the community, paying tribute to the spirit of collaboration and support that drives LTC athletics.

The Barn includes three locker rooms, a dedicated private space for an

athletic trainer, and a concessions stand that will serve outdoor athletic events. Additionally, the upper portion of the building offers ample storage space for equipment and supplies. Weight training and cardiovascular equipment in The Barn was donated by Crawford Memorial Hospital.

"The Barn represents a significant investment in our athletic programs and our students' success," said Tona Ambrose, president of Lincoln Trail College. "We are committed to providing our student-athletes with the resources they need to excel both on and off the field. This facility will serve as a cornerstone of our athletics program and will help us foster a winning culture."

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Jenny Saad, athletic director at LTC, emphasized the importance of The Barn in enhancing the student-athlete experience. "We want to provide our athletes with everything they need to succeed in one location, making training and practices more convenient and effective."

LTC, IECC LAUNCH VIRTUAL CAMPUS TOURS

Illinois Eastern Community Colleges have launched virtual campus tours, giving prospective students a closer look at each campus's classrooms, labs, and common areas from anywhere in the world. The project, led by IECC Director of Marketing and Public Information Chris Forde, aims to provide a detailed, immersive experience to help students visualize life at Lincoln Trail College and its sister institutions.

To build the virtual tours, Forde visited

each campus to capture 360-degree photos of essential spaces. With coding assistance from Cameron Ireland, these panoramic images have been integrated into each college's website, allowing prospective students to explore college facilities from their own devices.

While IECC encourages students to visit campus in person, Forde says the virtual tours are a valuable option for those who can't make the trip, especially international students and athletes. "We believe that visiting in person is the best way to experience the energy and community on our campuses," said Forde. "But we understand that not everyone has that opportunity. For students across the world, and those who might be balancing travel with athletic commitments, these virtual tours offer the next best thing."

Forde says the Marketing Department worked with Enrollment Management to get campus tour scripts so that the virtual tours could capture the same information students visiting campus would receive.

"We were also able to add additional information within each 360-degree image," says Forde. "We can embed information, website links, videos, and photos within the images. That gives prospective students a chance to watch videos about programs and hear from instructors and students."

By building the tours in-house, Forde says the Marketing Department was able to save IECC a considerable amount of money. "We've had companies pitch us similar tours, and they cost \$15-20,000 per campus. They also didn't offer the flexibility of updating tours without additional costs. We can update our tours anytime, and there's no additional cost to updating the tours."

The virtual tours provide potential students and their families a comprehensive view of each college, allowing them to better understand IECC's facilities and resources. By bringing these tours online, IECC hopes to make its campuses accessible to a broader audience and highlight its commitment to student convenience and engagement.

LTC PUTS A FOCUS ON CAMPUS SAFETY



Lincoln Trail College is prioritizing safety with ongoing emergency preparedness activities and training. In October, the college took part in the Great American Shakeout, a nationwide earthquake drill. LTC students, faculty, and staff practiced "Drop, Cover, and Hold On" on October 17 at 10:17 a.m., reinforcing their knowledge of earthquake safety procedures.

LTC will continue its safety efforts in November with a campus-wide fire drill scheduled for November 15 at 11:15 a.m. These drills are part of the college's commitment to providing a safe and responsive environment for all members of the campus community.

"We're consistently focused on emergency readiness here at Lincoln Trail," said Chris Forde, LTC's Coordinator of Marketing and Public Information. "Our goal is to ensure that everyone on campus knows what to do and feels prepared in the event of an emergency."

In addition to drills, Lincoln Trail College holds monthly safety meetings to assess and improve campus safety protocols. The college also works closely with local emergency responders to enhance preparedness and strengthen relationships for effective crisis response.

"Building and maintaining strong relationships with local emergency services is key to our emergency response plan," Forde said. "Our connections with agencies in Crawford County ensure that we're prepared to respond quickly and collaboratively in any situation."

The campus safety meetings have included representatives from law enforcement, firefighters, and emergency dispatchers. They have shared their knowledge with LTC's safety team. The Robinson Fire Department even gave the team a training session on how to properly use fire extinguishers.

Beyond his role with LTC, Forde brings extensive experience to his position, serving as the chairman of the Crawford County 911 Emergency Telephone System Board (ETSB), which oversees the county's 911 system. Forde has also been a Police Commissioner for the City of Robinson and is a certified ALICE (Alert, Lockdown, Inform, Counter, Evacuate) instructor, enabling him to bring a depth of safety knowledge to the college.

"Our commitment to safety is ongoing," Forde added. "Through training, regular safety meetings, and coordination with local agencies, we're doing everything we can to protect our campus community. I applaud President Tona Ambrose for making campus safety a priority."



VANDEHATERT COMMITS TO DBU



Aiden VanDeHatert, a left-handed pitcher at Lincoln Trail College, has officially committed to continue his baseball career at Dallas Baptist University after his upcoming graduation in May. VanDeHatert's impressive growth and dedication on and off the field have earned him this opportunity to compete at the next level. During his time at Lincoln Trail, VanDeHatert has shown substantial development under the guidance of LTC Head Coach Collin Maynard. Coach Maynard highlighted VanDeHatert's growth, saying, "Aiden has seen substantial growth during his time at LTC. Up to this point, he has gained nearly 5 MPH on his fastball since first stepping on campus, and I expect even more to come this year. He has also worked diligently to develop his secondary pitches to keep hitters off balance."

Coach Maynard also praised VanDeHatert's readiness for the challenges ahead. "I believe Aiden's time at Lincoln Trail has prepared him well for the challenges he will face at Dallas Baptist University. He has learned to face adversity head-on, and I know that Aiden will never back down from a challenge." Looking toward VanDeHatert's future at DBU, Coach Maynard expressed his confidence in his former player's potential to make an immediate impact. "I envision that Aiden will have a chance to step into an immediate impact role at Dallas Baptist University. I believe that he has the ability to make an impact in their program, and I know his work ethic will continue just as it was here."

Beyond his on-field abilities, VanDeHatert's leadership has also been a key asset to Lincoln Trail's program. "Aiden's presence and leadership leave a large impact with our team. He is always pushing his teammates to work hard and get the most out of themselves. He is also one of the loudest guys in the dugout and is always the first one to help pick up a teammate."

For VanDeHatert, the decision to commit to DBU was driven by the school's strong baseball culture and coaching staff. "What influenced me the most to commit to Dallas Baptist was the culture and coaching staff. Dallas Baptist has built a culture of success that I am excited to be a part of and continue to help them win. They also have an experienced coaching staff that I trust to put me in great positions to succeed and develop into the player that I can become."

VanDeHatert also credits his experience at Lincoln Trail for preparing him for the next level. "Playing at Lincoln Trail has prepared me for the next level with the coaching I have received and the competition we play. Our pitching coach, Coach Wells, has been able to help me develop as a player and on the mental side of pitching. This has helped me grow as a player and person. We also play great competition throughout the year in the GRAC, preparing me for what is coming next."
