IECC Named Among Aspen Institute's Top 200 U.S. Community Colleges

Olney Central College is celebrating a significant achievement as Illinois Eastern Community Colleges has been named among the Top 200 U.S. Community Colleges by the Aspen Institute College Excellence Program.

This national recognition highlights the ongoing commitment to academic excellence, student achievement and community service within IECC, which encompasses Frontier Community College, Lincoln Trail College, Olney Central College and Wabash Valley College.

OCC President and IECC Vice Chancellor of Business Operations Chris Simpson said the recognition underscores the hard work taken to ensure student success within IECC.



"This recognition is validation of the dedication and commitment of the Olney Central College faculty and staff," he said. "An accomplishment such as being recognized as a Top 200 Community College in the nation only happens through the efforts of many people putting student success at the forefront."

It's a distinction that places IECC among the top 20 percent of nearly 1,000 community colleges eligible to compete for the \$1 million Aspen Prize for Community College Excellence—the nation's signature recognition of achievement and performance in two-year higher education. The Aspen Prize honors colleges that excel in student outcomes such as retention,

completion, transfer and workforce success, while advancing equity and continuous improvement.

"Olney Central College has a proven track record of student success," Simpson emphasized. "These areas include student completion rates, transfer pathways, workforce development, and dual credit opportunities for area high school students."

The Aspen Institute has recognized Olney Central College in eight of the nine award cycles since the program's inception in 2010 — a reflection of OCC's longstanding record of excellence within Illinois Eastern Community Colleges and its ongoing dedication to student achievement and community impact.

"The mission of Olney Central College and Illinois Eastern Community Colleges is to deliver exceptional education and services to improve the lives of our students and to strengthen our communities," Simpson said. "By placing student needs at the center of our decision-making, we have been able to work toward this mission — and this recognition reflects that."

He added that continuous improvement remains central to OCC's vision for the future.

"Improvement is an ongoing process that continues year after year," Simpson said. "As circumstances in our communities and the larger region change, Olney Central College needs to be able to adapt to these changes. Being nimble and able to quickly make necessary adjustments is a strength of OCC and something that helps us align our practices with student success."

Simpson also praised the faculty and staff who contribute daily to the college's success as they share their expertise and knowledge with OCC students.

"The faculty and staff at Olney Central College are among the most dedicated and committed I have had the pleasure to work with," he said. "Many of them are alumni of Olney Central College or another one of the Illinois Eastern Community Colleges, so they have a deep understanding of the role community colleges play in helping students move forward."

Simpson noted that the Aspen Institute recognition reaffirms the exceptional educational experience students receive across IECC and underscores why choosing Olney Central College truly is the Best Decision Ever.

"Students at Olney Central College, or those considering OCC for their post-secondary experience, have validation that choosing OCC is a great decision," he said. "It's a decision that will put them in a great position to move forward, whether that be transferring to a four-year institution or completing an associate degree or certificate. Preserving campus icons

Two campus landmarks — the Equinox and OCC sculptures — were cleaned by O&M Team Leader Dan Brant last month. The Equinox Sculpture was designed by now retired OCC Art Instructor Vic Connor in the early 1980s and constructed by students in the OCC Welding Program. Large rocks were placed at the site in 2001 and notched to designate the sun's zenith on the Spring and Fall equinoxes and the Summer and Winter solstices. The 2011 Welding Class fabricated the OCC sculpture.

Hospital Donation Expands Real-World Training for OCC Radiography Students

Olney Central College Radiography students will now have access to a C-arm machine on campus after the Carle Richland Memorial Hospital Radiology Department donated the previously used equipment.

In medical settings, the advanced imaging device uses X-ray technology and a characteristic C-shaped arm to provide real-time, high-resolution images during surgical and interventional procedures.

"It allows physicians to visualize internal structures such as bones, joints and surgical instruments during orthopedic, cardiovascular and pain management procedures," said OCC Director of Radiography Lisa Rauch. "The live imaging capability helps guide precise positioning, verify

correct placement of hardware and reduce the risk of complications during surgeries and interventional procedures."

Rauch explained that having access to a C-arm on campus will give radiography students the opportunity to gain hands-on experience with equipment they will use in clinical practice.

"It enhances their understanding of fluoroscopic imaging principles, radiation safety and positioning techniques used in surgical and interventional settings," Rauch continued. "This real-world exposure better prepares students for their clinical rotations and future employment in hospitals and surgical centers."

Carle Richland Memorial Hospital recognizes the value of supporting local healthcare education and offered the C-arm to the Olney Central College Radiography Program when it was replaced by a newer unit in their facility.

"The donation reflects a long-standing partnership between the hospital and the college, both of which share a commitment to training highly-skilled imaging professionals who serve the community," Rauch said.

The donation comes as the OCC Radiography Program prepares to move into the new Health Professions Center. The 8,500-square feet addition to Dr. Kent L. Wattleworth Hall includes new classroom and lab space.

"Students will use the C-arm in laboratory simulations to practice setup, patient positioning, equipment operation and image orientation," Rauch said. "They will learn how to maneuver the C-arm safely around the patient table, apply appropriate radiation protection measures and capture optimal images under supervision. These controlled lab exercises reinforce classroom learning and bridge the gap between theory and clinical application."

Rauch said donations like this strengthen the program by allowing students to learn on authentic, up-to-date medical equipment without the financial burden of costly purchases.

"They ensure that students receive the most realistic and relevant training possible, helping maintain program quality and accreditation standards," she said. "Additionally, these partnerships with healthcare facilities foster community collaboration and demonstrate mutual investment in the success of future healthcare professionals."
