Guided Pathways Session Info

OCC THEATER

At IECC, we've been talking about Guided Pathways for a few years now. It's one of our top priorities in the final year of our Forward Together strategic plan. But let's be honest: for some of us, the phrase Guided Pathways may still feel vague or overly academic. So let's clear it up. It is important for *everyone* at IECC to understand the Guided Pathways model because *all of us* play a role in implementing it!

Guided Pathways is not just about choosing a major or creating a transfer checklist. It's about rethinking how students experience college from the moment they first connect with us. From their first experience with admissions, advising, or their first class—all the way to graduation, transfer, or a job. It's not a single program, it's a new way of organizing the whole student experience so that more students succeed.

For decades, community colleges have offered students a "cafeteria style" option of classes to choose from. Too often we've often expected them to figure out the rest on their own. That worked for some. But for first-generation students, adult learners, and those balancing work and family, that model can lead to confusion, wasted credits, and burnout.

Guided Pathways helps change that by creating clear, supported routes through college. Students still make choices—but they don't have to do it alone. Here's how it works, based on four key ideas:

1. We Clarify the Paths. We organize our programs of study into clear, career-aligned pathways that are easy to understand. Each one lays out exactly what classes a student needs to take—and in what order—to stay on track and finish on time.
2. We Help Students Choose a Path Early. Instead of just signing up for general education classes and figuring it out later, we help students explore options early. That includes real advising, career assessments, and tools to help them choose a direction that fits their goals.
3. We Help Students Stay on the Path. This means more than checking in once a semester. Guided Pathways builds in progress tracking, early alerts, and strong support systems so that if a student falls behind or hits a barrier, we know—and we help before it's too late.
4. We Make Sure Students Are Learning What Matters. We focus on teaching that connects directly to students' goals—whether that's transfer or entering the workforce. Faculty help shape programs that are coherent, relevant, and rigorous, and we make sure what students are learning matches what they'll need next.

At IECC, we've already begun. Our advisors and faculty have drafted early versions of these pathways. We've launched Degree Works. Our website is being updated to show students the way more clearly. And we're starting to align our policies, schedules, and student services so that all four of our colleges are working together in support of student success. Our new Student Affairs division is playing a key role in this work—reimagining orientation, building a stronger first-year experience, and developing Learning Commons that bring together academic support, technology access, and student resources in one place. It's all part of a systemwide shift – outreach, business, academics, student affairs, and technology - to help students start stronger and stay on track.

This fits naturally with the larger work we've done to become a more unified system. Guided Pathways gives us a smart, coordinated way to use our resources better so students don't fall through the cracks, and faculty and staff can focus their time and energy where it matters most.

Increasing Retention Efforts with CRM Advise (Faculty)

These tools will expand the impact of the work that faculty members are already doing by enhancing internal communication to effectively promote student success across IECC. You will learn the process of submitting early alerts and about the automated email processes to students and faculty when early alerts are submitted. CRM Advise and MyIECC Experience will not only change how we view retention interactions, but also the many opportunities IECC has to promote student success.

Degree Works

The session will highlight key features such as live on-on-one tutoring, question drop-off, and the paper center for writing feedback.

Credit Where Credit Is Due: Cracking the Code on Credit Hours

We'll break down the Illinois Community College Board regulations, walk through how lecture and lab hours are defined, and explore how to accurately input your course info into the Credit Hour Calculator. Bring your syllabus and your questions – we'll wrap up with real-world examples to ensure you leave confident (and compliant).

First Year Experience -- A Foundation of Success

The First Year Experience (FYE) is foundational for college students' academic and social success. Find out about the initiatives that IECC has developed to help students adjust to the transition from high school to the demands of college life. These efforts aim to help students navigate new academic expectations, build social connections, and learn about campus resources. FYE initiatives positively impact student retention and overall degree completion rates.

Mental Health 101

This presentation will examine practical strategies and support for students' mental health. We will briefly define mental health, identify common signs and symptoms, and discuss their impact. We will examine influential factors such as Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs), the unique challenges of student transitional moves, and the biological aspects of mental health, including injury-related impacts (e.g., sports, accidents). We will explore and expand our knowledge and understanding of practical strategies for cultivating empathy and providing meaningful support to our students.
