## OCC holds Groundbreaking for Applied Technology Center

Olney Central College celebrated upcoming construction of the 8,000-square-foot Applied Technology Center with a Groundbreaking Ceremony on January 15.

Funded through the Rebuild Illinois capital program, the \$3.15 million project represents a significant investment in the future of healthcare education and workforce readiness in the region.

Construction will involve a major addition to Dr. Kent L. Wattleworth Hall to house OCC's nursing and radiography programs. The new facility will feature state-of-the-art classrooms, high-tech simulation and skills labs, faculty office space, a student lounge, laundry facilities, and enhanced storage. Notably, radiography students will benefit from having an energized lab on campus for the first time in the program's history.

"Through Rebuild Illinois, we're investing in the infrastructure of community colleges to open doors for students and strengthen local communities," Illinois Governor JB Pritzker stated in a joint announcement with the Illinois Capital Development Board. "The Applied Technology Center at Olney Central College will enhance healthcare education in Southeastern Illinois, equipping students with state-of-the-art tools and hands-on learning to build a stronger, more resilient healthcare workforce for the region,"

Lisa Hennigh, Deputy Director of Construction for the Illinois Capital Development Board, was among the guest speakers during last month's event.

"This is more than just new construction. It's an opportunity for Illinois students who want to pursue careers in nursing and radiography," she said. "These students will receive invaluable hands-on learning experiences with innovative technology. This project will be a launching pad

for highly-trained professionals ready to enter the healthcare workforce across Illinois and serve their communities with the knowledge they gained at Olney Central College. We are thrilled to begin this journey together and see the lasting impact this facility will have not just on the OCC campus, but also in the broader community and healthcare industry."

The Applied Technology Center marks the largest classroom addition at OCC in more than a decade and the most extensive renovation to OCC's main building since its opening in 1974. The project includes revamping existing classrooms 106, 107 and 108 and seamlessly integrating them into the new facility, designed by Graham & Hyde Architects, Inc., and being built by Shores Builders, Inc.

"The Applied Technology Center at Olney Central College represents our commitment to delivering state-of-the-art education through advanced simulation and hands-on learning," said Dean of Health Professions Dr. Alani Frederick. "Nursing students will be immersed in a realistic hospital environment, allowing them to develop critical clinical judgment in a safe, supervised setting. Radiography students will gain essential experience in our energized lab, where they'll take X-rays under the guidance of expert faculty to ensure precision. By blending cutting-edge technology with expert instruction, we're preparing our students to become highly skilled healthcare professionals ready to meet the demands of today's workforce."

During the ceremony, Frederick stressed the far-reaching impact the Applied Technology Center will have within the community and the programs it serves.

"As we educate radiologic technologists, we currently graduate around 15 students a year," she said. "In the next 20 years, the training in our energized lab will allow 300 radiologic technologists to enter into our healthcare facilities. If these 300 technologists image 10 pictures a day, that is 3,000 images a day that will be delivered safely due to this investment. Over the next 20 years, the nursing simulation lab will teach over 1,500 nursing students how to respond to medical emergencies, how to assist in childbirth and how to help families transition loved ones into death with dignity and grace. When those students enter the workforce, those 1,500 nurses — should they care for just 10 patients a week, - would help over 15,000 patients a week, 60,000 patients a month and 780,000 patients a year."

Frederick continued, "When you consider this building can improve over 3,000 images a day and the care of 15,000 patients a week, the cost of the building seems insignificant. The impact this investment will have is nearly incomprehensible. The commitment from the state of Illinois and Illinois Eastern Community Colleges to ensure highquality education will touch more lives than any of us in the room can imagine." Remarks were also given by OCC President Chris Simpson and David Leggans of Graham & Hyde Architects. In addition to state funding, OCC has received more than \$400,000 in financial support from the community to complete the project. This includes the Olney Central College Foundation's pledge of more than \$150,000 over the next five years along with contributions from Wabash General Hospital, the Johnsie Flock Fildes Foundation, the Richland County Board and the City of Olney. OCC also received a generous gift given in memory of Phyllis Fehrenbacher by her family.

The Applied Technology Center will open in 2026.

## OCC ensuring white squirrels thrive on campus



Olney Central College is taking measures to ensure the campus' white squirrel population continues to thrive by installing nesting boxes near the Applied Technology Center construction site.

"We had identified through the project a few trees that we knew would have to be taken down," said OCC President Chris Simpson. "We have a lot of white squirrel activity on campus. We wanted to be aware of that and take steps so if there was any disruption to their habitat, we were addressing it. We have never seen activity in the trees that were taken down, but there were nests in trees nearby."

Simpson reached out to white squirrel experts

for advice on maintaining a hospitable environment for Olney's most famous residents.

"We contacted retired OCC Instructor Dr. John Stencel, who initiated Olney's annual squirrel count in the 1970s, and Belinda Henton, who has worked for several years to maintain the city's white squirrel population," Simpson explained. "They guided us on what we needed to do."

When Simpson approached OCC Woodworking Instructor Kyle Kuenstler about constructing the custom-built nesting boxes, he was happy to lend his expertise.

"The boxes are very similar to birdhouses," Kuenstler said. "For the squirrels, the most important aspects are the perch and the access hole. They need a sturdy spot to stand on to get in and out safely and the hole must be small enough, so they feel safe, but big enough so they can enter and exit easily."

Kuenstler also designed the front board to be detachable allowing for old nesting materials and debris to be easily removed.

"We want to thank Kyle who embraced the project and donated his time to be able to do this," Simpson added. Along with the nesting boxes, the college plans to plant additional trees on the east side of Wattleworth Hall.

"There are some other recent projects on campus, which have required us to remove a few trees, and we want to replace those," he said "The minimum goal is to have a one for one replacement, and ideally two for one. We will be seeking grant funds to accomplish this once the Allied Health Project is completed."

Simpson said the plantings would primarily include oaks, hickories and walnuts, which would all benefit the white squirrels.

The U.S. Department of Education projects that over the next decade, there will be 47 million job openings, with about one-third requiring an associate's degree or certificate – credentials often obtained through CTE programs.

OCC students appreciate the hands-on learning and support they receive from experienced instructors.

"I would encourage people to join the Welding Program because there's so much to learn," said OCC Welding student Joshua Case. "Curtis is a great instructor. He is really energetic and I enjoy that so much of our learning is handson."

OCC Cosmetology students also find value in hands-on learning and the personal attention and industry experience provided by their instructors.

"My favorite thing about the Cosmetology Program is how much the teachers care and want you to be better," said Madisyn Etheridge. "They do a great job teaching the basics and helping you learn from those."
